RE: Data Breach Notification

To Whom It May Concern:

We continue to serve as counsel for Northwest Retirement Plan Consultants, LLC ("NWRPC") located at 413 29th St. NE, Suite D, Puyallup, WA, 98372. We write to provide supplemental notification to the February 28, 2025 notification and March 28, 2025 supplemental notice of a recent data security incident. By providing this notice, NWRPC does not waive any rights or defenses under Washington law, including the data breach notification statute.


On September 2, 2024, NWRPC experienced a network disruption that affected its ability to access certain systems. Upon discovery, NWRPC promptly launched an investigation, engaging third-party forensic specialists to contain the incident and assist with understanding the nature and scope of the disruption. As part of the investigation, NWRPC learned that certain information within its systems was acquired by an unauthorized individual on or around August 31, 2024. NWRPC began a thorough review of the potentially impacted data to determine the types of information that may have been affected and the individuals to whom it relates. On January 15, 2025, this process confirmed the presence of personal information, and NWRPC worked with clients to perform additional address validation efforts to provide individuals with notification on the client's behalf as soon as possible. Following completion of NWRPC's initial review, on February 28, 2025, NWRPC notified identified individuals.

As NWRPC's investigation into the scope of impact continued and it worked with clients to make notice on their behalf, NWRPC provided notification to newly validated individuals on a rolling basis, including additional notification waves on March 28, 2025, April 28, 2025, May 12, and May 19, 2025. This includes notification to an additional 384 Washington residents. The information potentially impacted included first and last name, date of birth, financial account information and/or Social Security number. The written notice letters include instructions to access complimentary credit monitoring and identity protection services for 12 months and is substantially similar to the notification template previously provided and is attached as Exhibit A. NWRPC is providing this supplemental notification on behalf of Friedman & Bruya, Inc., Law Office of John Duggan, PLLC, Legacy Group, Inc., Van Well Nursery, Inc, Kutscher Benner Barsness & Stevens, and Saybr.

As part of our investigation, we have learned that certain information within our systems was acquired by an unauthorized individual on or around August 31, 2024. We began a thorough review of the potentially impacted data to determine the types of information that may have been affected and the individuals to whom it relates. On April 15, 2025, our extensive review process was completed, and we worked to perform additional address validation efforts to provide you with notification as soon as possible.

What We Are Doing: We have taken the steps necessary to address the incident and are committed to fully protecting the information that you have entrusted to us. Enroll in Credit Monitoring and Identity Protection Services

To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to www.mytrueidentity.com and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: <Code>. These services provide you with alerts for twelve (12) months from the date of enrollment when changes occur to your TransUnion credit file. This notification is sent to you the same day that the change or update takes place with the bureau. Finally, we are providing you with proactive fraud assistance to help with any questions that you might have or in event that you become a victim of fraud. These services will be provided by Cyberscout, a TransUnion company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services.

In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.

Monitor Your Accounts

We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your credit reports/account statements for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Report any questionable charges promptly to the financial institution or company with which the account is maintained.

Order Your Free Credit Report

Under U.S. law, you are entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, TransUnion, Experian, and Equifax. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call toll-free at 1-877-322-8228. Once you receive your credit report, review it for discrepancies and identify any accounts you did not open or inquiries from creditors that you did not authorize. Look in the “personal information” section for any inaccuracies in information (such as home address and Social Security Number).

If you have questions or notice incorrect information, contact the credit reporting bureau by calling the telephone number on the report. Errors may be a warning sign of possible identity theft. You should notify the credit bureaus of any inaccuracies in your report, whether due to error or fraud, as soon as possible so the information can be investigated and, if found to be in error, corrected.

Place a Fraud Alert on Your Credit File

Security Freezes

As an alternative to a fraud alert, you have the right to place a credit freeze on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without your express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you must contact the credit reporting agency by phone, mail, or secure electronic means and provide proper identification of your identity. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Address for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (e.g., state driver's license or identification card); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft, if you are a victim of identity theft.

Notice of Data Breach

Northwest Retirement Plan Consultants (“NWRPC” or “we”) writes to notify you of an incident that may have involved some of your personal information as described below. NWRPC provides retirement plan services to various companies, including your current or former employer. NWRPC takes the privacy of information in our care seriously, and while we have no evidence to suggest that any information has been misused to date, we are providing you information about the incident, our response, and steps you can take to protect your information should you feel it is necessary to do so.

What Happened: NWRPC experienced a network disruption that affected our ability to access certain NWRPC systems. In response, we promptly launched an investigation, engaging third-party forensic specialists to contain the incident and assist with understanding the nature and scope of the disruption. As part of our investigation, we have learned that certain information within our systems was acquired by an unauthorized individual on or around August 31, 2024. We began a thorough review of the potentially impacted data to determine the types of information that may have been affected and the individuals to whom it relates. On January 15, 2025, this process confirmed the presence of personal information, and we worked to perform additional address validation efforts to provide you with notification as soon as possible.

Order Your Free Credit Report

Once you receive your credit report, review it for discrepancies and identify any accounts you did not open or inquiries from creditors that you did not authorize. Look in the “personal information” section for any inaccuracies in information (such as home address and Social Security Number).

If you have questions or notice incorrect information, contact the credit reporting bureau by calling the telephone number on the report. Errors may be a warning sign of possible identity theft. 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Security Freezes

As an alternative to a fraud alert, you have the right to place a credit freeze on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without your express authorization.

The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you must contact the credit reporting agency by phone, mail, or secure electronic means and provide proper identification of your identity. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Address for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (e.g., state driver’s license or identification card); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft, if you are a victim of identity theft.

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Once you have submitted your request, the credit reporting agency must place the security freeze no later than 1 business day after receiving a request by phone or secure electronic means, and no later than 3 business days after receiving a request by mail. No later than 5 business days after placing the security freeze, the credit reporting agency will send you confirmation and information on how you can remove the freeze in the future.
