This notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Eisner Advisory Group LLC ("Eisner") does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Washington law, the applicability of the Washington data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On September 9, 2023, Eisner became aware of suspicious activity with respect to a limited set of information. Eisner then launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the incident. The investigation determined that there was unauthorized access to this limited set of information between September 4, 2023, and September 9, 2023, and that these certain files were acquired by an unknown actor. In response, Eisner conducted a detailed review of the files determined to be at risk by this incident to identify the type of information stored therein and to whom that information related. On February 13, 2025, Eisner completed this review.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, Social Security number, driver's license or state identification information, passport number, financial account information, date of birth, medical information, and health insurance information.

Notice to Washington Residents

On April 8, 2025, Eisner provided written notice of this incident to two thousand one hundred twenty-one (2,121) Washington residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Eisner moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of Eisner systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Eisner has also implemented and is continuing to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. Eisner is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through IDX, a Zerofox Company, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

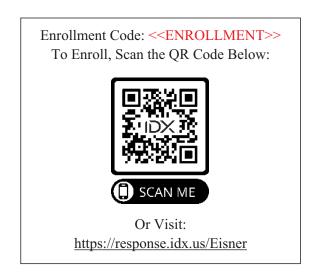
Additionally, Eisner is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Eisner is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, information on protecting against tax fraud, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Eisner is providing written notice of this incident to relevant state regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

Eisner Advisory Group LLC ("Eisner") is contacting you to notify you of an incident that affects some of your personal information. We are providing you with this notice to make you aware of the incident, the steps we are taking in response, and steps you may take to help protect your personal information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? In September 2023, Eisner became aware of suspicious activity with respect to a limited set of information. We thoroughly investigated the nature and scope of the incident and subsequently determined that there was unauthorized access to certain files that occurred between September 4, 2023 and September 9, 2023, that such files were acquired by an unknown actor, and that access by the unknown actor was limited solely to those files. In response, we conducted a detailed review of the files determined to be at risk by this incident to identify the type of information stored therein and to whom that information related. In February 2025, we completed this review and determined that information related to you was contained in the files determined to be at risk. Our continuing investigation into this incident is now concluded. While we have no evidence of any actual or attempted misuse of information, we are notifying you out of an abundance of caution and to make you aware of the incident.

What Information Was Involved? The information impacted by this incident includes your name and <<Variable Text: Impacted Data Elements>>.

What We Are Doing. We take this incident and the security of personal information entrusted to us very seriously. Upon becoming aware of this incident, we took immediate steps to investigate. We have notified state and industry regulators as required. We have also notified law enforcement of this incident. As an added precaution, we are offering you complimentary access to <<12/24>> months of credit monitoring services, through IDX. You will need to enroll yourself in these services if you wish to do so, as we are not able to activate them on your behalf. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud, to review your account statements and monitor free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. In addition, we encourage you to promptly report any suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement, the Federal Trade Commission, and/or your state Attorney General.

Enroll in Monitoring Services

- **1. Website and Enrollment.** Scan the QR image or go to https://response.idx.us/Eisner and follow the instructions for enrollment using your Enrollment Code provided at the top of the letter. Please note the enrollment deadline is July 8, 2025.
- **2. Activate the credit monitoring** provided as part of your IDX identity protection membership. The monitoring included in the membership must be activated to be effective. Note: You must have established credit and access to a computer and the internet to use this service. If you need assistance, IDX will be able to assist you.
- **3. Telephone.** Contact IDX at 1-877-782-4279 to gain additional information about this event and speak with knowledgeable representatives about the appropriate steps to take to protect your credit identity.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer's name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information
