

Cheryl, congratulations on being named Acting Chairman. You are now the Henry VI, Edward IV or Grover Cleveland of FERC; to my knowledge no one has ever been Chairman twice. I would like to offer my two cents on the issue at hand, how FERC balances its responsibility to continue to serve the public upon loss of quorum with the degree of legal risk. I contact you directly out of recognition that time is short, with Norman's impending departure.

In my view, FERC can continue to fully function with two members with acceptable legal risk, and the 1993 delegation order reflects a very conservative view. That order should not be viewed as the definitive statement on how the agency can function, or not function, upon loss of quorum. It is only one option. If the exercise at hand is balancing the agency's obligation to continue to serve the public despite loss of quorum against degree of legal risk that order avoids all legal risk at the expense of continued service.

There is a 1982 DC Circuit case (<u>Railroad Yardmasters of America v Harris</u>, 721 F.2d 1332) that addressed the issue of whether an agency can continue to function with the loss of quorum. The decision relied heavily on a vacancy provision in its holding that a quorum was only needed to meet, not to act. The court relied on other statutory provisions in it reasoning, including a delegation provision. But the court could have reached the same result relying solely on the vacancy provision. No way to prove one way or the other, I acknowledge. But that is certainly arguably correct. There is a similar but not identical vacancy provision in Part I of the Federal Power Act. I read that sentence as still effective, since it does not conflict with anything in the DOE Organization Act. If "no vacancy in the commission shall impair the right of the remaining commissioners to exercise all the powers of the commission" then the remaining two members are the Commn and can continue to exercise its powers. That phrase arguably could be read as being limited to a single vacancy, but it could also be argued to apply to multiple vacancies, on the grounds that if Congress had intended the vacancy provision in the FPA to apply to only a single vacancy it would have used the indefinite article. I think the key holding in <u>Railroad Yardmasters</u> is that a quorum is only needed to meet, not to act, and I don't view that holding as specific to the organic act being examined there.

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A variant would be to vest all power in the Chairman and require the Chairman to consult with the other Commissioner before acting, consistent with the 2nd NRC emergency order. That would avoid the prospect of 1:1 ties. Another way to avoid ties is to authorize the Chairman to break tie votes in the event they arise.

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If the Commn would find it easier to act along these lines in response to a petition for interim rule that could probably be arranged.







Dear Acting Chairman LaFleur:

I write to request detailed information on all dams owned, operated, permitted, or inspected by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in California in order to better understand the current procedures for inspection and maintenance of these structures.

The spillway failure at California's Oroville Dam highlights the need for comprehensive evaluation of our nation's safety standards, inspection protocols, and emergency planning for dams. This fully avoidable disaster forced more than 188,000 Californians from their homes and cost millions of dollars in emergency assistance. According to recent estimates, the cost to repair the damage and retrofit the Oroville Dam to an acceptable safety standard could exceed \$100 million.

Like many Californians, I am deeply concerned that FERC's dam safety inspections may not adequately consider the safety consequences of increasingly extreme weather patterns linked to climate change or considerable seismic hazards. The federal dam inspections, guidelines, and relicensing process should set the highest possible standard for safety. Therefore, I ask that you provide the following information for all FERC-licensed dams, levees, and related structures in California:

- When the last inspection took place of each FERC-licensed dam and flood control structure and the results of those inspections
- When the next inspection is planned, who will conduct the inspection, and the details of the inspection process for each flood control structure

- How FERC incorporates the latest available climate and weather science into its inspection protocols and any emergency planning protocols
- How FERC plans to update its inspection protocols in the wake of the Oroville disaster, particularly with regard to the use of non-destructive testing and assessment methods

In addition to the specific information requested above, I would welcome any additional recommendations that could help FERC improve dam safety, inspections, maintenance, flood control, and emergency planning in California.

DOE STUDY -- TIME FOR ENERGY PRICE FORMATION REFORM!

Last evening, the Department of Energy (DOE) released the grid study requested by Secretary Rick Perry in April. Our initial review of the study suggests that while DOE poses a task list for the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to undertake, it has not dictated how the Commission should move forward.

We had expected the DOE to formally recommend the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) undertake a rulemaking to address the complaints of baseload power providers – primarily coal and nuclear plant operators – who have been struggling with historically low wholesale market power prices. While DOE does not request a specific rulemaking, DOE calls on FERC to "expedite" its (ongoing) efforts with states, regional transmission organizations (RTOs) and other stakeholders to "improve" energy price formation, and cites a June proposal from PJM Interconnection and a 2011 proposal from the Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO) as potential starting points. DOE explicitly asserts that negative offers (often made by wind resources at night) "should be mitigated to the broadest extent possible." The study offers seven other recommendations, among them a call for FERC to "study" requiring "valuation of new and existing [Essential Reliability Services] ERS" through the establishment of fuel-neutral markets or other regulatory mechanisms capable of offering compensation for necessary reliability services.

We think these recommendations (see Figure 1, inside) are likely to be supported by coal-fired power plant owners, and owners of nuclear assets that are not operating in New York or Illinois – the two states that have adopted a Zero Emissions Credit (ZEC) to support nuclear power assets. We expect several constituencies to press FERC to move on DOE's recommendations quickly – with an eye to seeing RTOs adopt market rule changes by next spring. While we do not yet know how quickly FERC may decide to act, we expect the Commission's choice of a procedural vehicle to address the study's recommendations may offer greater clarity on timing.



POLITICO Pro Q&A: FERC Commissioner Rob Powelson

11/02/2017 05:00 AM EDT Rob Powelson, who joined FERC this summer, has found himself serving as something of an ambassador from the states during one of the agency's most

turbulent periods. A Republican with a more than eight-year tenure as a Pennsylvania energy

regulator, Powelson made headlines recently for saying that he didn't join FERC "to go blow up the markets" after Energy Secretary Rick Perry unveiled a controversial grid proposal aimed at propping up coal-fired and nuclear generation.

His five years as chairman of the state commission included Hurricane Sandy in 2012, and the 2014 "polar vortex" — an event Perry often cites to justify his proposed rule. But where the Energy Department's plan chides the reliability of natural gas during that cold snap, Powelson said "there were enough sins in there that everybody had some responsibility" and that grid operators are adapting to the "new normals of weather."

We're at an "inflection point" for the future of the electricity markets, Powelson told POLITICO in a recent interview. He said he wouldn't stand in the way of states that want to do more to address climate change — "If states want to want to

value carbon, they should be able to do it" — but he urged patience from everyone waiting for FERC action on pricing reform and state policies. *This interview has been edited for length and clarity.*

Your home state is a big chunk of the PJM market. But last week Pennsylvania's state legislature approved a resolution supporting the DOE proposal while the utility regulator called the plan "unwieldy, untimely and impractical."

As I often said in my prior life: God forbid the legislature has to make a decision that the PUCs have to make — raise rates, fine companies, revoke licenses. That's why you have independent agencies like FERC and state public utilities commissions that have to do economic regulation and safety regulation.

I think there are forces at play that wanted to put that marker out. When you peel it back, I think now back in Pennsylvania, as of Friday, there's 500 trillion cubic feet of natural gas under the ground. If you're the Marcellus Shale Coalition, you're like "What happened to us in this discussion?"

The legislature put a marker down ... but at the end of the day, the resolution is not binding. It's not an act of law.

Pennsylvania is among the states that may consider out-of-market policies to help nuclear. So, what keeps you up at night more — addressing state subsidies or the pricing issues?

I'm a states' rights advocate, but there are two things that drive what we do here. There's the Federal Power Act, and there's the Natural Gas Act. FERC Order 888 created this wholesale construct in the market. In the mid-2000s, probably 26 or so states ... did [renewable portfolio standards]. Republican states, Democratic states — those RPSs have driven strong investments in renewables. ...

Pennsylvania, and other states, are [asking], "Do we embed in the RPS a nuclear standard?" Some are doing that after the fact.

And then there are some who have said these RPSs have caused a distortion in the market as we get to grid parity and we get more scale of renewables and the impact that that's having. ... These state policies obviously drove an outcome. Today, an unintended consequence is that some people say these states have not valued nuclear.

There are a lot of moving parts. To FERC's credit, we look at the markets and how they're functioning and how we value things like resiliency, and how we keep markets functioning. That's what I'm looking at. This is an inflection point. No doubt about it.

For you, is anything other plant retirements driving market policy changes? If there is a deep concern about grid resiliency, and we can use events like the polar vortex, the recent hurricanes, and we can use derechos — these new weather events, the new normals of weather. The RTOs are saying, "Look, the velocity of these storms and the impact they have on the generation fleet, we think, yeah, we should do a deeper dive and value resilient resources." On the flip side to that is you've had states that have looked at things like microgrids, and they're doing grid resiliency.

The polar vortex was alarming in the sense you had a 24 percent forced outage rate. There were enough sins in there that everybody had some responsibility. But then you go to the next year, February of 2015, on another very bad cold snap there wasn't a 24 percent forced outage rate and the system performed. Right after 2014, PJM put forth the construct of capacity performance. And, by the way, we're not 100 percent into the capacity performance [process]. We have another

auction of capacity performance results and then we're fully into a fully integrated CP. I personally want to see where we stand there. That's a longer term view. I want to see how capacity performance is working and ... how it deals with reliability.

Why isn't there an agreed upon set of facts around the polar vortex?

Capacity performance was a direct outcry of the polar vortex. ... I was told, as chairman, that capacity performance would provide the needed uplift compensation metrics to deal with these types of events going forward — meaning that these baseload resources will be adequately compensated by this. **In your mind, has that turned out to be true?**

I'm still waiting. When we get to 100 percent, I think we'll have a story to tell. You've crossed paths with Perry a couple of times since the proposal came out. Have you made your views clear to him?

To his credit, he's looking at this issue in terms of — as the head of DOE — reliability, resiliency. He's looking at the sustainability of these markets. There are a lot of moving parts to this conversation. I don't mind that there's a little bit of impatience. Chairman [Neil] Chatterjee and I are the new FERC guys. I get it. This is an issue that has been elevated in the conversation of energy policy. I've been very direct in my position in support for markets.

Commissioner Cheryl LaFleur has often talked about the "doors" to how that conflicts with states gets resolved: planned re-regulation, unplanned re-regulation, litigation and/or some kind of harmonization.

The state policy changes are ongoing with us. ... Personally, I'd like to see us get our hands around that conversation. If states want to want to value carbon, they should be able to do it. They've done it with things like the [Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative]. California has a cap and trade model. States have said, "Look, in lieu of a hard price on carbon on the national level, there are mechanisms for valuing it." And it's not my job to tell those states you can't do that.

Is it FERC's job to tell them they should do that?

I don't think so. What we're saying is that if you're going to design constructs, you better make sure they adhere to certain market principles. Trying to answer your question, yes, post-technical conference, there's a genuine commitment to handle the state piece. There are a couple of options, but I'll be straight up with you, I can't get into where they would go.

FERC's authority over the RTOs is fairly absolute. Can you see any scenario where FERC overrides the RTOs and the states to impose something akin to what Perry has proposed?

I think we'd be hard-pressed to not engage stakeholders like our states and our RTOs, independent market monitors.

Is there a chance FERC expands the footprint of the DOE proposal to include areas outside of PJM, New York and New England?

I've thought about it. I don't have any preconceived outcome. Most people would say that this is more of a PJM, New England, NYISO issue. But there's not a lot of coal left in New England.

I'm trying to be patient here and seeing where we go internally with staff recommendations.

How do you view your role with FERC after eight-plus years at the statelevel?

My biggest takeaway is that I respect the independence of FERC. I worked for three governors.

What's very important to me is maintaining the independence of this agency because the people that work here look for that kind of guidance. In my view, not that there's been issues in my short tenure here, but it's important that you maintain that. The same could've said under the Obama administration. Our engagement with the states is now, more than ever, so critical.

Some have argued that it's been the imperialistic FERC, at times — that we've been very top-down.

The DOE NOPR hasn't necessarily helped improve the image of FERC's independence.

The NOPR, based on my cursory review of the state comments — and we're doing forecasting — have been 98 percent against. Obviously, this is a big issue. It's an inflection point for the FERC.

You've said this is an inflection point a few times.

We've come through the conversations post-Order 888 in the 1990s, to the future of the markets to ... today, the \$64,000 question: What's working and what's not working in markets, and how to do we keep those markets sustainable, long-term.

If there's a deficiency, how do you fix it fast enough to make a difference? To Secretary Perry's credit, he has certainly stimulated a conversation or — as some would say — a call to action. That's healthy. I'm an impatient regulator, by nature. But some of this stuff has to be thought through. We have to develop a record and we have internal capacity to look at what's working and not working in markets.

If I could stress one thing, I need everybody in this town to remain calm, understand that the FERC is working hard around these issues.

I'm actually kinda giddy to be here at this point in time. It's a good challenge for us to have. The big question is, where do we go?

Is the DOE proposal at all distracting?

No, it's nothing personal. I think they were trying to say is that we've had all these things and when you lose the quorum, the train stops. ... You can't take up a notational vote on an issue of this magnitude.

Neil and I have only been on the job less than [three] months. I'm asking people to be patient with us too. We're the new people here. And it'd be nice to have two other colleagues to be part of this conversation.

Please join me in welcoming James Danly and thanking David Morenoff.



D.C. CIRCUIT DENIES APPEAL OF FLEX LNG'S DOE LICENSE

Today, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit (D.C. Circuit) issued a <u>unanimous opinion</u> upholding the Department of Energy's (DOE) issuance of a license to Freeport LNG Export (FLEX) to export natural gas to non-free trade agreement destinations. Our impression of the oral argument held on February 2, 2017 led us to conclude that the environmental group's license appeal looked likely to fail. It did, however, the Trump Administration is now planning to modify its approach to infrastructure permitting generally in an announcement planned for later today.

The Sierra Club and other environmental groups had pressed the court to find the DOE's review under the *National Environmental Policy Act* (NEPA) and the *Natural Gas Act* (NGA) as insufficient. The DOE first adopted the facility-specific analysis taken by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), and then reviewed the FLEX project in the context of other proposed projects before it at the same time in two DOE-sponsored studies that it developed for context of the then-pending reviews. The first study was developed by the Energy Information Administration (EIA) and the second was developed on DOE's behalf by NERA Economic Consultants. DOE subsequently evaluated the project in the context of an Addendum report that specifically addressed the potential indirect impacts of natural gas exports not captured in the scope of the FERC's review, and a fourth study from the National Environmental Technology Labs to evaluate life-cycle greenhouse gas emissions.

Sierra Club criticized DOE's reliance on these generalized studies, and alleged that the Department was obligated to evaluate regional impacts at a more detailed level. However, the court found DOE's reasoning persuasive when it explained that notwithstanding the likelihood of natural gas originating from some predictable areas, the interconnected nature of the U.S. natural gas system also meant that export volumes could notionally come from anywhere. The DOE's took this higher-level view, and the court validated it. At the end of the day, the court found that the DOE's review was sufficient to meet its independent agency requirements associated with LNG licensing under NEPA. The court upheld DOE's position that even while some additional analyses sought by the green groups may be possible, they would not necessarily be meaningful to DOE's evaluation of the projects under NEPA. The D.C. Circuit has set oral arguments in three Sierra Club appeals of the non-FTA licenses for Cove Point, Sabine Pass Trains 5-6, and Corpus Christi for October 18. In Figure 78 of the August 14 edition of the *Regulated Energy Playbook*, published to clients yesterday, we detail the primary arguments advanced in each of the cases. We think that Sierra Club's chances of forcing reconsideration of the NEPA reviews of DOE's license approvals may fail as well, given the court's rationale in today's FLEX ruling.

The court found Sierra Club's public interest challenge in FLEX to be limited to environmental issues, which the court dismissed given the NEPA challenges failed. In three of the four pending cases (the fourth is a challenge to the expansion volumes at Sabine Pass Trains 1-4, but not yet scheduled for oral argument), Sierra Club alleges that DOE's assessment of the public interest is arbitrary and capricious for concluding exports would provide economic and other benefits that outweighed the potential adverse environmental impact.

The appeal against Cove Point, in our view, tracks strongly with the appeal contesting FLEX on the public interest issue, and we think DOE may prevail there. However, Sierra Club contends that DOE inadequately considered the full impacts on the public at large as opposed to the economic benefits primarily enjoyed by shareholders in natural gas production and export companies in the two Sabine Pass appeals and the Corpus Christi case. We will be watching to see whether argument in these cases suggests that the Sierra Club's subsequent appeals resolve the deficiencies enumerated by the court today, or whether, like FERC's reviews, the DOE's license approvals will stand.

In the context of President Trump's planned announcement this afternoon of an Executive Order to "expedite" infrastructure project approvals, we would reiterate a theme we raised in the wake of the election. Under the Obama Administration, agencies expanded the scope of their environmental reviews, much to the frustration of project applicants frustrated with delays. However, many of those reviews have withstood judicial scrutiny – indeed, the D.C. Circuit rejected all four challenges to the FERC's NEPA review of LNG export facilities to date (none are currently pending) before upholding DOE today. In that context, a significant reversal of course on permit reviews by the Trump Administration – if quicker-paced reviews turn out to be materially less robust – could create incremental judicial review risk for future projects.

As we all know, many of our colleagues and friends in states affected by Hurricanes Harvey and Irma have faced the sort of natural disaster that few of us will ever experience or completely comprehend. Although the actual storms have passed, the efforts to restore, rebuild, and regroup are ongoing.

During and after these tragic catastrophes, restoring power means more than being able to turn on the lights. It means returning to a sense of normalcy and providing safety for all those who need it most.

Though our states may be separated by distance or perspectives, I am grateful that we can come together through our thoughts, prayers, and support of the people and communities affected by these storms. Our colleagues in the Hurricane-ravaged areas are on the frontlines monitoring the situation and many of our state utilities are participating in mutual assistance programs.

Therefore, I would also like to share with you a <u>Statement of FERC and NERC on</u> <u>Electricity Industry Assistance to Hurricane Irma Recovery</u>. Please read the statement, as it not only recognizes the historic context of this event, it rightly praises the efforts to restore service and notes that assistance efforts will not have negative implications regarding Reliability Standard FAC-003-4 Vegetation Management. NARUC supports this joint statement and appreciates the sentiments expressed.



authority to act upon requests for exempt wholesale generator status under section 32 of the Public Utility Holding Company Act.

We expect FERC to issue a similar delegation order this week before Commissioner Bay departs. In a podcast issued yesterday, Acting Chairman LaFleur stated that staff delegated authority will be increased in anticipation of the lack of quorum. As with the 1993 order, it does not appear that a delegation order could adequately address pending interstate pipeline certificates required to commence construction or other major orders.



Mr. Chairman, attached is the document filed by Valero requesting emergency relief and expedited consideration of a waiver of the Reid vapor pressure (RVP) specification for conventional and reformulated gasoline present in the Colonial pipeline tariff. Also appended to the filing is the broad waiver of the RVP regulatory requirement already issued by the US Environmental Protection Agency on Wednesday. It is our understanding that Colonial supports timely FERC intervention in this matter. Further, discussions with EPA and the Department of Homeland Security likewise support timely federal action to ensure motor fuels restored along the Colonial line as expeditiously as possible. State actors in Texas, including the Railroad Commission, the Texas Council on Environmental Quality, and the Office of the Governor have been actively involved in attempts to timely resolve this matter.

We hope the FERC can take action on this matter as soon as possible. The EPA RVP waiver was designed to remove bottlenecks in getting motor fuel to market that resulted from Hurricane Harvey. FERC intervention as soon as possible will help effectuate this decision of the federal family - helping restore production in the Gulf and protecting consumers around the country.

POLITICO Pro Q&A: FERC Commissioner Rob Powelson

Rob Powelson, who joined FERC this summer, has found himself serving as something of an ambassador from the states during one of the agency's most turbulent periods.

A Republican with a more than eight-year tenure as a Pennsylvania energy regulator, Powelson made headlines recently for saying that he didn't join FERC "to go blow up the markets" after Energy Secretary Rick Perry unveiled a controversial grid proposal aimed at propping up coal-fired and nuclear generation.

His five years as chairman of the state commission included Hurricane Sandy in 2012, and the 2014 "polar vortex" — an event Perry often cites to justify his proposed rule. But where the Energy Department's plan chides the reliability of natural gas during that cold snap, Powelson said "there were enough sins in there that everybody had some responsibility" and that grid operators are adapting to the "new normals of weather."

We're at an "inflection point" for the future of the electricity markets, Powelson told POLITICO in a recent interview. He said he wouldn't stand in the way of states that want to do more to address climate change — "If states want to want to value carbon, they should be able to do it" — but he urged patience from everyone waiting for FERC action on pricing reform and state policies.

This interview has been edited for length and clarity.

Your home state is a big chunk of the PJM market. But last week Pennsylvania's state legislature approved a resolution supporting the DOE proposal while the utility regulator called the plan "unwieldy, untimely and impractical."

As I often said in my prior life: God forbid the legislature has to make a decision that the PUCs have to make — raise rates, fine companies, revoke licenses. That's why you have independent agencies like FERC and state public utilities commissions that have to do economic regulation and safety regulation.

I think there are forces at play that wanted to put that marker out. When you peel it back, I think now back in Pennsylvania, as of Friday, there's 500 trillion cubic feet of natural gas under the ground. If you're the Marcellus Shale Coalition, you're like "What happened to us in this discussion?"

The legislature put a marker down ... but at the end of the day, the resolution is not binding. It's not an act of law.

Pennsylvania is among the states that may consider out-of-market policies to help nuclear. So, what keeps you up at night more — addressing state subsidies or the pricing issues?

I'm a states' rights advocate, but there are two things that drive what we do here. There's the Federal Power Act, and there's the Natural Gas Act. FERC Order 888 created this wholesale construct in the market. In the mid-2000s, probably 26 or so states ... did [renewable portfolio standards]. Republican states, Democratic states — those RPSs have driven strong investments in renewables. ... Pennsylvania, and other states, are [asking], "Do we embed in the RPS a nuclear standard?" Some are doing that after the fact.

And then there are some who have said these RPSs have caused a distortion in the market as we get to grid parity and we get more scale of renewables and the impact that that's having. ... These state policies obviously drove an outcome. Today, an unintended consequence is that some people say these states have not valued nuclear.

There are a lot of moving parts. To FERC's credit, we look at the markets and how they're functioning and how we value things like resiliency, and how we keep markets functioning. That's what I'm looking at. This is an inflection point. No doubt about it.

For you, is anything other plant retirements driving market policy changes?

If there is a deep concern about grid resiliency, and we can use events like the polar vortex, the recent hurricanes, and we can use derechos — these new weather events, the new normals of weather. The RTOs are saying, "Look, the velocity of these storms and the impact they have on the generation fleet, we think, yeah, we should do a deeper dive and value resilient resources." On the flip side to that is you've had states that have looked at things like microgrids, and they're doing grid resiliency.

The polar vortex was alarming in the sense you had a 24 percent forced outage rate. There were enough sins in there that everybody had some responsibility. But then you go to the next year, February of 2015, on another very bad cold snap there wasn't a 24 percent forced outage rate and the system performed. Right after 2014, PJM put forth the construct of capacity performance. And, by the way, we're not 100 percent into the capacity performance [process]. We have another auction of capacity performance results and then we're fully into a fully integrated CP. I personally want to see where we stand there. That's a longer term view. I want to see how capacity performance is working and ... how it deals with reliability.

Why isn't there an agreed upon set of facts around the polar vortex?

Capacity performance was a direct outcry of the polar vortex. ... I was told, as chairman, that capacity performance would provide the needed uplift compensation metrics to deal with these types of events going forward — meaning that these baseload resources will be adequately compensated by this.

In your mind, has that turned out to be true?

I'm still waiting. When we get to 100 percent, I think we'll have a story to tell.

You've crossed paths with Perry a couple of times since the proposal came out. Have you made your views clear to him?

To his credit, he's looking at this issue in terms of — as the head of DOE — reliability, resiliency. He's looking at the sustainability of these markets.

There are a lot of moving parts to this conversation. I don't mind that there's a little bit of impatience. Chairman [Neil] Chatterjee and I are the new FERC guys. I get it. This is an issue that has been elevated in the conversation of energy policy. I've been very direct in my position in support for markets.

Commissioner Cheryl LaFleur has often talked about the "doors" to how that conflicts with states gets resolved: planned re-regulation, unplanned re-regulation, litigation and/or some kind of harmonization.

The state policy changes are ongoing with us. ... Personally, I'd like to see us get our hands around that conversation. If states want to want to value carbon, they should be able to do it. They've done it with things like the [Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative]. California has a cap and trade model. States have said, "Look, in lieu of a hard price on carbon on the national level, there are mechanisms for valuing it." And it's not my job to tell those states you can't do that.

Is it FERC's job to tell them they should do that?

I don't think so. What we're saying is that if you're going to design constructs, you better make sure they adhere to certain market principles. Trying to answer your question, yes, post-technical conference, there's a genuine commitment to handle the state piece. There are a couple of options, but I'll be straight up with you, I can't get into where they would go.

FERC's authority over the RTOs is fairly absolute. Can you see any scenario where FERC overrides the RTOs and the states to impose something akin to what Perry has proposed?

I think we'd be hard-pressed to not engage stakeholders like our states and our RTOs, independent market monitors.

Is there a chance FERC expands the footprint of the DOE proposal to include areas outside of PJM, New York and New England?

I've thought about it. I don't have any preconceived outcome. Most people would say that this is more of a PJM, New England, NYISO issue. But there's not a lot of coal left in New England.

I'm trying to be patient here and seeing where we go internally with staff recommendations.

How do you view your role with FERC after eight-plus years at the statelevel?

My biggest takeaway is that I respect the independence of FERC. I worked for three governors.

What's very important to me is maintaining the independence of this agency because the people that work here look for that kind of guidance. In my view, not that there's been issues in my short tenure here, but it's important that you maintain that. The same could've said under the Obama administration. Our engagement with the states is now, more than ever, so critical.

Some have argued that it's been the imperialistic FERC, at times — that we've been very top-down.

The DOE NOPR hasn't necessarily helped improve the image of FERC's independence.

The NOPR, based on my cursory review of the state comments — and we're doing forecasting — have been 98 percent against. Obviously, this is a big issue. It's an inflection point for the FERC.

You've said this is an inflection point a few times.

We've come through the conversations post-Order 888 in the 1990s, to the future of the markets to ... today, the \$64,000 question: What's working and what's not working in markets, and how to do we keep those markets sustainable, long-term.

If there's a deficiency, how do you fix it fast enough to make a difference?

To Secretary Perry's credit, he has certainly stimulated a conversation or — as some would say — a call to action. That's healthy. I'm an impatient regulator, by nature. But some of this stuff has to be thought through. We have to develop a record and we have internal capacity to look at what's working and not working in markets.

If I could stress one thing, I need everybody in this town to remain calm, understand that the FERC is working hard around these issues.

I'm actually kinda giddy to be here at this point in time. It's a good challenge for us to have. The big question is, where do we go?

Washington Week: FERC preps for meeting; White House reaffirms Paris stance

After a long hiatus, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission this week will hold its first monthly meeting since January, further paving the way for the agency to whittle down a backlog of major project applications, rate cases and other pending issues.

The Sept. 20 meeting will be held by temporary FERC Chairman Neil Chatterjee, newly confirmed Commissioner Robert Powelson and Commissioner Cheryl LaFleur, who at one time served as the agency's chairman. The commission has not held a monthly meeting since January, shortly before former Chairman Norman Bay left the agency and reduced the number of sitting commissioners to two — short of the three needed to achieve a quorum that allows FERC to decide on significant interstate infrastructure projects and other regulatory matters.

While waiting on new commissioners, FERC staff issued delegated orders on certain matters, subject to further order. With its quorum back, the commission could reverse some of the staff's decisions. The agenda for the Sept. 20 meeting does not appear to include high-profile or controversial matters, but industry members will soon get a glimpse of how FERC's new members lean on key issues.

Chatterjee, who is chairing FERC while the U.S. Senate considers the nomination of Kevin McIntyre to that post, has voiced support for coal generation and could press for policy changes to give the fuel more support in wholesale power markets. Chatterjee told lawmakers at a Sept. 14 hearing that the grid appeared stable but did not rule out potential regulatory fixes to make baseload plants more competitive if the commission identifies reliability risks resulting from coal and nuclear plant closures.

Other pressing issues before FERC include whether and how to facilitate state clean energy goals in FERC-regulated electricity markets, a proposed rule to advance use of energy storage resources, and a backlog of energy infrastructure projects totaling about \$14 billion in private capital.

Senate to move on more nominations

The energy sector could get a better sense of FERC's thinking on those subjects after the Senate votes on President Donald Trump's two other nominees to the commission. On Sept. 19, the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee will vote on McIntyre and Senate Democratic aide Richard Glick's nominations to FERC, as well as consider candidates for key posts at the U.S. Department of Interior and Department of Energy. If the committee approves the nominations, they will head to the full Senate for approval.

The Senate Environment and Public Works Committee will also consider several nominations this week for agencies touching on energy, including assistant administrators for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Jeffrey Baran's nomination to a new term at the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

The U.S. House of Representatives is out of session this week but will reconvene the last week of September, when the House Energy and Commerce Committee's Energy Subcommittee will hold the second of two hearings on grid reliability. The first featured Chatterjee, Gerry Cauley, North American Electric Reliability Corp's president and CEO, and Patricia Hoffman, Acting Assistant Secretary for DOE's Office of Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability.

Other witnesses were due to testify, but the subcommittee split the hearing into two parts. A witness list for the second hearing has yet to be released but could include the heads of several power industry groups asked to appear at the original hearing, including the Nuclear Energy Institute, American Wind Energy Association and the American Coalition for Clean Coal Electricity.

The hearings are meant to explore a range of possible reliability risks, including outages from extreme weather events that some are tying to climate change. President Trump has dismissed the link between climate change and the severity of recent hurricanes Irma and Harvey, but members of his cabinet still hope to work with other countries on the issue.

White House Chief Economic Advisor Gary Cohn requested a meeting with senior climate and energy ministers ahead of the United Nations General Assembly meeting, which starts in New York on Sept. 19. The meeting is aimed at helping the Trump administration forge a global strategy on lowering greenhouse gas emissions despite the president's decision to pull the U.S. out of the Paris climate agreement.

The White House faced a minor uproar over the weekend after the Wall Street Journal reported the Trump administration was considering staying in the pact "under the right conditions." The story generated speculation that Trump was softening his stance on withdrawal, but the White House quickly dismissed the idea. Trump's official position when he announced the Paris exit in June was that the U.S. would consider staying in the agreement if the country got a better deal, although many signatories to the pact have said they were unwilling to renegotiate. Another big energy development this week will be the U.S. International Trade Commission's decision on whether domestic solar cell and module manufacturers have been hurt or threatened by rising imports. The ITC is scheduled to issue its decision on the matter Sept. 22. Defenders of the trade action say imports are unfairly punishing domestic manufacturers, but opponents say additional safeguards against imports would increase the cost of solar technology, disadvantaging the energy source against fossil fuels and other resources.

Xcel recommends Midwest Reliability Organization as SPP grid overseer

With the Southwest Power Pool planning to dissolve its unit overseeing compliance with federal reliability rules on its grid, Xcel Energy has recommended that job should go to the Midwest Reliability Organization, which performs the same role for SPP's neighboring grid operator, the Midcontinent Independent System Operator.

SPP announced in July that it would no longer serve as the "regional entity" enforcing grid reliability rules on behalf of the North American Electric Reliability Corp. (NERC). At that time, NERC called on participants in SPP's market—which ranges across 14 south-central and Great Plains states—to make recommendations on what entity should take over that role in SPP.

SPP is the only U.S. regional transmission organization (RTO) that still carries a dual role as a reliability entity and grid operator. SPP also said its RTO footprint no longer aligns with the geographic area where it oversees reliability.

In a September 8 press release, Xcel recommended that SPP select the Midwest Reliability Organization, or MRO, as its new compliance authority, saying the MRO could consolidate operations across the Midcontinent Independent System Operator and SPP and save money for utilities such as Xcel with operations in both RTOs.

Minnesota-based Xcel Energy is weighing in because its Texas-New Mexico operating company – Southwestern Public Service Co.—is in SPP.

Sources have said since July that the most obvious candidates to take over the SPP reliability work are MRO, the Texas Reliability Entity or SERC Reliability Corp., which covers much of the Southeast. All three are contiguous with SPP's footprint.

Avista and Hydro One of Ontario ask regulators to approve their merger

Avista Corp. and Hydro One Ltd. are asking regulators to approve their plan to merge

across national boundaries with far flung, noncontiguous service territories.

Hydro One is Canada's largest electricity transmission and distribution service provider and distributes power to over 1.3 million residential and business customers covering approximately 75% of the geographic area of Ontario.

Avista provides electric generation, transmission and distribution services to 378,000 retail customers in Washington, Idaho and Montana and distributes natural gas to 342,000 retail customers in Washington, Idaho and Oregon. Avista subsidiary Alaska Electric Light and Power Co. provides electric generation, transmission and distribution services to 17,000 retail customers in Juneau, Alaska.

Pursuant to a merger agreement announced in July, Avista would become a subsidiary of Hydro One and Avista's stock would be delisted from the New York Stock Exchange. The Province of Ontario will own a substantial but noncontrolling share of the merged company. The \$5.3 billion purchase price would be comprised of an equity purchase of \$3.4 billion and indirect assumption of about \$1.9 billion in debt.

The proposed deal is subject to approval by a wide range of regulatory approvals, including that of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, Idaho Public Utilities Commission, Oregon Public Utility Commission, Montana Public Service Commission, Alaska Regulatory Commission, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, the Federal Communications Commission and clearance of the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States.

Avista and Hydro One have now formally begun seeking those approvals, including that of FERC and several state commissions. In their joint application to the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, the companies said that while the Ontario Energy Board regulates the rates and practices of certain affiliates of Hydro One, it has no say over the the proposed merger, and no other Canadian authorities need to sign off on the deal.

In ticking off some of the benefits of the proposed deal, the companies explained that as the trend toward electric and gas utility consolidation continues, Avista is one of the smallest investor-owned utilities remaining in North America. The merger will place the combined companies in the middle range of investor-owned utilities on the continent in terms of size, the companies said, and will allow them to spread costs of new technology and infrastructure for the benefit of nearly two million customers.

Sharing technology and other benefits of scale will not occur in the near term, but cost savings will flow through to customers in future general rate cases, the companies said. However, Avista and Hydro One promise to flow through to Avista's retail customers in Washington, Idaho and Oregon a combined rate credit of at least \$31.5 million over a 10-year period.

The companies also reported that Avista's board of directors will retain authority over certain regional matters without any obligation to obtain separate authorization from the Hydro One Board. Avista will keep its brand name, and its headquarters will remain in Spokane, Wash. Avista will not have any workforce reductions and will keep its existing management team and office locations in each of its service areas. Avista will also keep its compensation and benefit practices and power to negotiate with employee bargaining units, the companies said.

Until 2015, the Province of Ontario owned Hydro One and predecessor Ontario Hydro but has since become an investor-owned utility. On Nov. 5, 2015, Hydro One completed its initial public offering on the Toronto Stock Exchange by way of a secondary offering of common shares by the province, with the goal of 60% of the company being held by private investors.

As of July 31, the province owned 49.9% of Hydro One's shares. Assuming the merger is completed, the province's level of ownership will decline to below 45%. The Ontario Electricity Act of 1998 restricts the Province from owning less than 40%, according to the merger applications.

Hydro One connects generating facilities operated by Ontario Power Generation Inc. and a number of privately owned companies. Ontario Power is a province-owned Crown corporation.

U.S. is the land of opportunity for Canadian utilities

Hurricane Irma had left Florida's grid reeling, and U.S. EPA wanted all hands on deck.

Among the recruits: four huge power plants operated by Tampa Electric. The natural gas- and coal-fired generators could belt out 4,668 megawatts at full tilt, which the state wanted to run without liability. On Sept. 10, EPA relaxed enforcement standards for these stations, agreeing that they were necessary "to ensure adequate supply of electric power."

Hurricane Irma is probably not how Nova Scotia-based Emera Inc., TECO's parent, expected to make its money. But in a way, the disaster highlights exactly why the Canadian utility expanded to the United States in the first place.

Emera's Florida utility is regulated, meaning whatever the company does in the recovery, regulators will help it get its money back and then some.

That's why, despite the disaster, Credit Suisse Group AG analysts Andrew Kuske and Paul Tan felt confident the company would be made whole. "EMA's path to regulatory recovery for storm-related damages should not be negatively affected for the underlying utilities," they wrote last week. (Credit Suisse has disclosed business with Emera in the last year.)

It's a less-than-excellent time to be in the U.S. power business, with demand flat and natural gas suppressing the price of electrons. But Emera and a handful of other Canadian companies have shown in recent years that they see a growth opportunity their home country can't provide: regulated U.S. utilities.

Right next to the Berkshire Hathaways and Duke Energys of the world, they're vying for some of the most coveted businesses on the U.S. grid. Where demand is growing, capital projects are needed and — most importantly — regulators will allow them a high rate of a return.

Moody's Investors Service counts \$36.5 billion of Canadian acquisitions over the last two years. The figure includes Fortis Inc.'s nearly \$12 billion takeover of Michigan transmission giant ITC Holdings Corp. It accounts for a smattering of smaller deals in natural gas and power utilities working from Alaska to Idaho to Missouri to Virginia.

"The U.S. is ripe with opportunity, probably more so than what domestic Canadian

players are seeing in Canada," said Jeremy Fago, U.S. power and utilities leader at PwC. "It's not just a generation shift; it's all of the infrastructure and logistics to support that generation shift. It's a bit of a perfect storm in the U.S."

The deal for TECO, in September 2015, came just two months after the Florida utility announced it was for sale.

Emera muscled in with an offer few could match: \$10.4 billion to buy all of TECO's stock and assume all \$3.9 billion of its debts.

In a conference call, Emera President and CEO Chris Huskilson beamed that the move would "essentially double the company."

Emera, once a utility serving tiny Nova Scotia, had gradually expanded into the Canadian Maritimes, New England and the Caribbean. But with few targets available in Canada, the company needed somewhere else to grow. TECO fit the bill.

"Our patience has really paid off. And we've been preparing ourselves for a transaction of scale with a regulated utility for some time," Huskilson said.

By acquiring TECO, Emera would become one of the 20 largest utilities in North America. It would obtain regulated gas businesses in New Mexico and Florida and regulated power in Florida. It would go from serving about 900,000 customers to serving 2.4 million customers.

The deal was so big that Emera's own books would be inverted: Instead of making half its revenue from Canada, it would make about 25 percent. More than 70 percent of its earnings would come from the United States.

"TECO's service territory, located in Florida, a state with high population growth is [the] envy of all major electric utilities," Greg Jones and Dot Matthews, analysts with CreditSights, wrote that year.

State and federal regulators approved the deal, and it closed in July 2016. Emera said it would keep the employees, buildings and subsidiary names of the company it bought.

Fortis looking for more U.S. deals

Fortis' deal to buy ITC was cut from similar cloth.

ITC's willingness to sell went public in November 2015. By February 2016, Fortis had stepped in with a \$11.3 billion offer, debt and all.

Fortis' motive, betrayed by years of successively larger acquisitions, was to finally go big in the United States. ITC represented the largest deal that Fortis, once a humble utility in Newfoundland, had ever signed.

Now it was hoping to become one of the 15 largest utilities in America. ITC owned and ran some 15,600 miles of power lines across the American heartland, from the Upper Midwest down to the Great Plains.

These power lines enjoyed "supportive [Federal Energy Regulatory Commission] regulation," with higher-than-average returns on equity, the companies noted.

When the deal closed in October 2016, it came with a quirk: ITC would be taken off the New York Stock Exchange. From now on, the value of these assets would be represented in Fortis' new ticker on the NYSE: FTS. On Oct. 19, President and CEO Barry Perry rang the NYSE's opening bell.

"There is a focus in the U.S. of switching to natural gas and renewables," Perry told Canada's Financial Post.

Perry said Fortis would continue to look for expansion opportunities in the United States because "we don't really see much opportunity" in Canada.

Many of Canada's large utilities are "crown corporations" with heavy public ownership — and the financial and political restraints that come attached.

"If you're looking to grow in Canada, there's not a lot of options. There's not a lot of companies that you can look to acquire," said Gavin MacFarlane, a vice president at Moody's.

Earnings potential

How are Canadian companies paying for all this? The answer: wide-open capital markets.

"Utilities' financing is very cheap right now," said Travis Miller, a utilities analyst with Morningstar Inc. "They're willing to pay up for growth opportunities and higherquality earnings potential."

Interest rates remain at post-recession lows. In terms of equity, regulated utilities still have their reputation as one of the safest, highest-value investments around, which means equity is also relatively cheap.

Utilities historically treasure their "investment-grade" ratings, the grade that brings in cash from pension funds and other institutions — also known as the biggest investors on Wall Street.

But in Emera's and Fortis' cases, the deals were structured to push investment grade to the limit — and not over it.

In July, Hydro One Ltd., a utility 49.9 percent owned by Ontario, announced its firstever acquisition in the United States. The target was Avista Corp., which sold power and gas to more than 700,000 customers in Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Alaska.

The rationale? Hydro One wanted to diversify from a 100 percent Ontario business to one that earned cash across geographies. The deal would allow it to expand from a rate base of \$14.1 billion to a total rate base of \$17.1 billion.

And it wanted some regulatory freedom: In Ontario, returns on equity were 8.8 percent, but Avista enjoyed ROEs between 9.4 and 12.9 percent.

The companies hope to have approval from all state and federal regulators by the end of 2018. If they do, the company will rank as a top-20 utility in North America by enterprise value. And another thing: If it goes through, Avista will come off the NYSE.

Washington absolutely must save the EMP commission

Only Washington bureaucrats could be so stupid they would terminate the

Commission to Assess the Threat to the United States from Electromagnetic Pulse (EMP) Attack, also known as the Congressional EMP Commission — just when North Korea threatened to attack the United States with EMP.

On Sept. 2, North Korea tested a thermonuclear H-bomb warhead for their intercontinental missiles capable of striking the United States. North Korea boasted their new warhead can generate "super-powerful EMP against a vast region."

EMP is like super-energetic lightning. Except instead of striking a point it can cover an entire nation, like the continental United States, with an EMP field.

A nuclear EMP attack would destroy electronics everywhere, cause planes to crash, stop cars and rail traffic, blackout electric grids and other critical infrastructures that make modern civilization, and life itself, possible. Eventually, millions would die from starvation, disease, and societal collapse.

The Congressional EMP Commission warned that a nationwide blackout lasting one year could kill up to 90 percent of the American people.

Thus, a nuclear EMP attack would be far deadlier than a nuclear strike that blasts a city.

North Korea knows this, which is why their state media describes the new thermonuclear warhead as capable of both blasting cities and making an EMP attack: "The H-Bomb, the explosive power of which is adjustable from tens of kilotons to hundreds of kilotons, is a multifunctional thermonuclear weapon with great destructive power which can be detonated even at high altitudes for super-powerful EMP attack according to strategic goals."

The Congressional EMP Commission has been warning for years — and now is obviously proven right — that North Korea knows about EMP and has been developing capabilities to make a nuclear EMP attack.

Indeed, in a recent article (published before North Korea's Sept. 2 nuclear test), Dr. William Graham, chairman of the Congressional EMP Commission, warned that North Korea's two satellites orbiting over the U.S. may pose an EMP threat:

After massive intelligence failures grossly underestimating North Korea's long-range missile capabilities, number of nuclear weapons, warhead miniaturization, and proximity to an H-Bomb, the biggest North Korean threat to the U.S. remains unacknowledged. North Korea has two satellites in orbit, and more to follow, that could be nuclear-armed for high-altitude electromagnetic pulse (EMP) attack that could blackout North America for months to years, killing millions ... This point appears to be beyond the comprehension of most, including secretaries of Defense, the military leadership, and the usual 'experts' who appear in the press.

Stupidly, the Department of Defense and the Department of Homeland Security intend to let the EMP Commission terminate on Sept. 30. Despite the ominous and growing EMP threat from North Korea, no one at DOD or DHS has asked Congress to continue the EMP Commission.

The House Armed Services Committee may establish a new EMP Commission and replace the existing EMP commissioners in the FY2018 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). But there is no substitute for the existing EMP Commission, which comprises the greatest body of expertise in the Free World.

The EMP Commissioners have proposed plans to protect the U.S from the existential

threat that is EMP—opposed by lobbyists for the electric power industry.

I am one of the founders of the original EMP Commission, along with former Maryland Republican Rep. Roscoe Bartlett. Together, between 1995-2001, we held numerous hearings on the EMP threat, establishing the EMP Commission in the FY2001 NDAA under Title XIV to begin the process of protecting our nation.

Terminating Title XIV, as proposed in the House NDAA, is another stupid idea, as it would reduce the Congressional EMP Commission to the status of a defense contractor and destroy its independence.

I appeal to my colleagues on the Senate Armed Services Committee to replace the House provision on the EMP Commission with this:

"The Commission to Assess the Threat to the United States from Electromagnetic Pulse (EMP) Attack, as described in the FY2001 Floyd D. Spence National Defense Authorization Act, Public Law 106-398, Title XIV, with all the powers and authorities invested in the EMP Commission under Title XIV, is hereby reestablished. The nine EMP commissioners, including the EMP Commission chairman, originally appointed to serve on the EMP Commission are hereby reappointed. Any new commissioners to fill vacancies on the EMP Commission shall be appointed by the secretary of Defense, in consultation with the chairmen and ranking members of the Senate and House Armed Services Committees. The commission shall deliver a report to Congress on threats to the United States from nuclear and non-nuclear EMP attack, natural EMP from solar storms, and other threat vectors to military and civilian critical infrastructures, 18 months from the date that the EMP Commission chairman certifies that the commission has received adequate funding, security clearances, and other support to commence work."

Hats off to Rob Powelson, my former staffer, newly appointed to the U.S. Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. Commissioner Powelson, I am sure, will continue the fight to protect our nation, even if the EMP Commission is destroyed.

Former Rep. Curt Weldon (R-Pa.) served as vice chairman of the House Armed Services Committee and of the House Homeland Security Committee. He sponsored the legislation that gave the United States a National Missile Defense, and was cofounder of the Congressional EMP Commission.

FERC lets Rover resume HDD at key sites

The US Federal Energy Regulatory Commission Monday gave the 3.25-Bcf/d Rover Pipeline project the go-ahead to resume horizontal directional drilling work at nine sites where the agency had halted work in May after releases of drilling fluids into Ohio wetlands.

While the new permission does not apply to every paused site, it does cover a key area important to the first phase of the project: the Captina Creek drill site in

southeast Ohio . Its location along the Clarington Lateral stands between several other upstream supply laterals and the project's mainlines.

In a letter Monday, Office of Energy Projects Director Terry Turpin said Rover had sufficiently satisfied the obligations imposed by commission staff in response to the inadvertent release of drilling mud at an HDD site near the Tuscarawas River — as well as the contamination of drilling mud at that location — to allow work to restart.

The agency specified that Rover may resume work at the following locations only: Captina Creek, Middle Island Creek (mileposts 24.78 and 25.30), Highway 151, Interstate 75, Sandy Creek, Prairie Lane, State Highway 3, Maumee River, and Indian Fork.

Several of those areas are sites Rover classified as "critical drill" sites in its February 2017 implementation plan for the project.

In its May 10 order halting some work, FERC allowed drilling to resume at a majority of Mainline A sites, but it blocked all drilling at Mainline B sites. Mainlines A and B are two 42-inch-diameter pipelines running in parallel west-northwest across Ohio, transporting production volumes from Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia to downstream delivery interconnects in northwestern Ohio.

The drilling re-authorization comes more than two months following the planned July 1 startup of the project's Phase 1 facilities, which are designed to include both mainlines, as well as four compressor stations and four supply laterals. On September 1, Rover placed into service a modified Phase 1A, which includes Mainline A facilities and no compressor stations. To this day, no compressors have been placed into service.

Flows on Rover have helped drive incremental US Northeast production gains in September. Of its roughly 700 MMcf/d of average flows so far, an estimated 200-300 MMcf/d is estimated to be "new," or incremental, production. The balance has been composed of volumes that, prior to Rover, were typically delivered into Texas Eastern Transmission and Dominion Energy Transmission in Ohio .

Prices at Dominion South for November delivery rallied 13 cents on Intercontinental Exchange following the Monday order.

The 3.25-Bcf/d Rover Pipeline project has been closely watched by gas market participants due to its large size and expected market impact, not only on production growth in the US Northeast but also on higher outflows to neighboring regions such as the US Midwest and Southeast and eastern Canada .

Amid the construction, the project has drawn intense scrutiny for environmental impacts in Ohio and West Virginia . After drilling releases in Ohio , FERC had ordered a third-party contractor review of the HDD work.

In his letter Monday, Turpin credited Rover with making sufficient progress in restoring some affected areas and developing specific plans to follow recommendations of that contractor, J.D. Hair & Associates, as well as staff recommendations for the nine crossings.

"Commission staff finds that utilization of these measures will help to ensure the risk of future inadvertent releases is minimized," Turpin said. He also noted that Rover has developed procedures to protect against future contamination of drilling mud by petroleum hydrocarbons.

In giving permission for that work to restart, FERC noted the decision does not have bearing on FERC's ongoing investigation into drilling fluid contamination at the

Tuscarawas River site, and the cause of that contamination.

FERC OKs Rover work with a warning on compliance

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission yesterday authorized an Energy Transfer Partners LP subsidiary to resume tunneling work that regulators had put on hold after a massive drilling fluid spill in wetlands near the Tuscarawas River in Ohio in April.

In a notice, FERC staff said Rover could restart horizontal directional drilling at nine road and river crossings, approving plans put forward by the company with support from independent consultants and spelled out in detail by FERC last month (Energywire, Aug. 24).

Those requirements include using extra pressure tracking devices at the drillhead as it bores under obstacles and keeping additional independent inspectors on site to monitor for unintended releases of drilling fluid.

The restart will help Rover meet its commitments to complete the pipeline by the end of this year. Work on laying pipe for much of the \$4.2 billion, 713-mile natural gas pipeline project has continued since FERC stopped certain work in May, and a portion of the pipeline was put into service at the end of August, but the company was unable to make progress on the final crossings necessary to complete the project.

Even as FERC granted Rover permission to move forward, officials warned the company that its continued cooperation was required as the agency investigates the April release of an estimated 2 million gallons of drilling slurry that was later found to be contaminated with traces of diesel fuel.

"We remind Rover ... that the Office of Enforcement (OE) continues to investigate the underlying cause of the drilling mud contamination, and we expect Rover to cooperate fully with OE staff with respect to that investigation," FERC wrote.

Rover did not immediately comment on the announcement.

Critics say corporate relationships may be distorting market needs

Natural gas pipeline permitting should be completely overhauled to more critically assess shippers' claims around the market need for their pipelines, industry critics charge in a new report out today.

In the report, the groups Oil Change International, Public Citizen and the Sierra Club

argue that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and state-level public service commissions are being misled by pipeline developers that profess a need for natural gas transmission that in many cases does not exist.

The authors point to corporate affiliations between pipeline companies and end users like utility holding companies as a key problem for several major pipeline projects currently in development. As a case study, they point to the proposed Mountain Valley pipeline, which is organized as a joint venture co-owned of EQT Midstream Partners LP, NextEra US Gas Assets LLC, Con Edison Transmission Inc. and two other midstream firms, with EQT — a natural gas processor with major interests in the Marcellus and Utica shale formations — as the operator.

The Mountain Valley pipeline's capacity is 100 percent subscribed by corporate cousins of the pipeline owners, a situation that the authors say puts it at risk for misleading assertions about demand for shipping capacity on the pipeline as the companies make their case to FERC for project approval.

As a result, the authors say, "The New York utility arm of Con Edison (Con Ed) could end up hitching its customers to over \$60 million per year in largely excess costs, while its transmission affiliate recoups profit as part owner of the pipeline."

The Mountain Valley pipeline is currently under environmental review before FERC. But it is also at the center of an ambitious lawsuit that challenges FERC's granting of eminent domain power to pipeline companies for the benefit of private interests, in a manner that landowners say trample their constitutional property rights (Energywire, Sept. 13).

The report also flags as vulnerable the Atlantic Coast pipeline proposed by Dominion Energy Inc., Duke Energy Corp., Piedmont Natural Gas Co. and Southern Co.; the PennEast pipeline being developed by New Jersey Resources Corp.; and the Nexus pipeline, a joint project of DTE Energy Co. and Enbridge Inc.

The critique also homes in on the 14 percent return on equity that FERC authorizes for new pipeline projects as a particular weakness. That rate, which the authors note was established 20 years ago, is out of step with today's low interest rates and incentivizes building new projects when they may not be needed, the report argues.

Finally, the authors take issue with regulators' failure to consider a bigger perspective on energy development as they weigh approvals for assets that could be in operation for 40 years or more.

"If power demand continues to flatten and decrease, and if necessary regulatory and legislative action to curb climate change is implemented, the pipelines being proposed now to facilitate production growth in the Appalachian Basin could be significantly underutilized," they wrote.

The authors take issue with FERC's resistance to considering alternatives to gas transmission in the portion of environmental reviews where such considerations are required.

For the PennEast project, that section read in part, "Because the purpose of the project is to transport natural gas, and the generation of electricity from renewable energy sources or the gains realized from increased energy efficiency and conservation are not transportation alternatives, they are not considered or evaluated further in this analysis."

That failure to consider alternatives to natural gas pipelines exposes the regulatory process to risk that pipelines will amount to white elephant projects as the energy

economy moves in other directions, the authors say.

The report warns that the combination of pipelines that may not truly be needed now but are being justified based on cozy corporate structures and overly generous guaranteed returns, layered with changing technologies and climate imperatives to move away from fossil fuel, could leave utility ratepayers saddled with long-term payments to support infrastructure that is barely used.

That argument largely aligns with environmentalists' proposal of a "carbon bubble" that overvalues fossil-fuel-based energy companies, based on the idea that many oil and gas resources cannot and ultimately will not be developed, as the world eventually conforms to greenhouse gas emissions limits to address climate change (Greenwire, Oct. 28, 2016).

Natural gas industry advocates, in contrast, describe the fuel as a cleaner alternative to coal for baseload electric power and a source of energy that is forecast by many analysts to see major demand growth both in the U.S. and around the world. A new analysis of world energy markets to 2040 by the U.S. Energy Information Administration envisions natural gas growth outpacing that of other fossil fuels over the coming decades and total utilization of natural gas far outstripping that of renewables by 2040 (Energywire, Sept. 15).

A permitting hiatus

To address the pipeline permitting problems identified in their assessment, the report authors call for FERC to cease all permitting of interstate natural gas pipelines while it initiates a review of long-term market demand for gas and of its rates of return on equity for pipeline projects.

They call on state regulators to step in as formal intervenors in all FERC pipeline dockets to represent ratepayers whose payments could go up with new pipeline development and to review potentially cozy contracts between developers and any off-takers with which they may be affiliated.

In fact, FERC is moving in the opposite direction as the confirmation of two new commissioners has returned the agency to a quorum that will allow it to resume consideration of major actions after a hiatus that began in February. The commission's first public meeting in months will take place tomorrow.

One of the body's first major actions after it resumed work was approval of the Nexus pipeline last month (Greenwire, Aug. 28).

The groups' call for state regulators to hold a hard line against pipeline development also runs up against the strong economic development that states like Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia have seen from new natural gas production, and expectations that local economies will continue to boom for as long as gas production and pipelines bring in tax revenues and jobs.

Greens demand FERC review climate impacts of two Marcellus pipes BY JIM DAY Foreshadowing likely litigation targeting the projects, environmental groups Monday called the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's environmental reviews of the controversial Atlantic Coast and Mountain Valley natural gas pipelines "fatally flawed" and demanded the commission conduct supplemental reviews to determine the projects' impacts on greenhouse gas emissions from combustion of the shale gas they carry.

In comments filed with FERC Monday, the Sierra Club and other green groups pointed to a ruling by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit last month that flatly rejected FERC's oft-stated position that the greenhouse gas (GHG) impacts from gas pipelines are not "reasonably foreseeable" and therefore do not merit detailed analysis under National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) reviews. In its August 22 ruling, the court said such GHG analyses are do-able and thus FERC violated NEPA requirements that it take a "hard look" at impacts of Enbridge's Sabal Trail pipeline in Florida and nearby states.

Citing that ruling, the Sierra Club suggested the same flaw infected FERC's final environmental impact statements (EIS) on two projects aimed at increasing takeaway from the Utica and Marcellus gas field—the Atlantic Coast pipeline proposed by Duke Energy and Dominion and EQT Midstream's Mountain Valley project.

The greens suggested FERC could only remedy those flaws by conducting supplemental environmental reviews of the two pipelines—a process that could take months and create a forum for public debate over the potential climate impacts of the pipelines, which already face fierce opposition from greens and some landowners over potential impacts on water quality and forests, along with eminent domain concerns.

The commission, which is now controlled by appointees of the industry-friendly Trump administration, appears unlikely to grant the greens' requests for a supplemental EIS—a refusal that the greens indicated would lead to a quick date in court.

"In light of the recent decision by the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals in Sierra Club v. FERC [regarding Sabal Trail], FERC must revisit its impacts analysis in the EIS for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline," said the environmental groups, which used similar language in their demand for a new greenhouse review of the Mountain Valley pipeline. "Pursuant to the D.C. Circuit's opinion, ... this analysis is not overly speculative and should inform the decision-making process. FERC's position to the contrary renders the Atlantic Coast Pipeline EIS fatally flawed."

The greens pointed to several passages of the Sabal Trail decision where the court rejected FERC's reasons for not conducting detailed GHG analyses. The opponents said FERC had used almost identical reasoning in the final environmental reviews of the Mountain Valley and Atlantic Coast pipelines.

Specifically, they called out FERC's finding in the Atlantic Coast EIS that the study of end-use combustion of the pipeline's gas as an indirect greenhouse effect was not warranted. In contrast, the greens noted, the D.C. court in its Sabal Trail ruling said that burning that pipe's gas for power generation "is not just 'reasonably foreseeable,' it is the project's entire purpose."

Similarly, the greens said FERC's conclusion in the environmental reviews that there is no accepted methodology to determine a project's impacts on the climate ran up against the D.C. Circuit's direction to FERC to explain why it does not use the Obama administration's "social cost of carbon" methodology.

The Mountain Valley pipeline would carry about 2 billion cubic feet per day (cfd) of shale gas from Pennsylvania and West Virginia to an interconnection in Virginia with the Transco pipeline that serves markets in the Southeast and Mid-Atlantic regions. The nearby Atlantic Coast pipeline would carry 1.5 billion cfd from West Virginia to customers in Virginia and eastern North Carolina, with the bulk of the gas going to generators owned by Duke and Dominion.

Both projects received favorable environmental reviews from FERC this summer, but they have come under heightened scrutiny as opponents are putting increasing pressure on the Democratic governors of Virginia and North Carolina to block them due to environmental concerns and questions about the need for new pipeline capacity amid tepid growth in power demand.

The Mountain Valley and Atlantic Coast developers did not respond to questions about the FERC filings Monday, but both have said previously that the FERC environmental reviews were exhaustive and fully considered.

Since the Sabal Trail decision, FERC authorized Enbridge and DTE Energy's Nexus gas pipeline in Ohio and Michigan, saying its GHG analysis was adequate even in light of the court ruling because the commission did determine the amount of GHG gas emissions that could result from combustion and that those emissions would not have a significant impact on the climate. FERC also said the circumstances of the Nexus project differed factually from Sabal Trail in that the gas would not necessarily be delivered to gas plants.

FERC could make similar arguments if it declines to supplement the environmental reviews for the Mountain Valley and Atlantic Coast pipelines. The commission did determine how much carbon dioxide-equivalent could be emitted from combustion of the gas carried in the pipelines, and it is not clear what the end use will be for all of the gas, particularly for the Mountain Valley project, which will deliver gas into the Transco system.

Even so, the Sierra Club Monday said those analyses fell far short of the "hard look" at impacts required by NEPA.

"[FERC] failed to provide an analysis that would meaningfully inform the public or decision-makers about this indirect effect—including its scope, significance, cumulative impact or potential mitigation and alternatives," the Sierra Club wrote of the Mountain Valley analysis. It said FERC wrote only five sentences in the final EIS regarding the project's GHG impacts, despite acknowledging that climate change could have far-reaching consequences.

Sierra Club wields Sabal Trail ruling against Atlantic Coast, Mountain Valley

The Sierra Club showed how it plans to use a recent court victory against the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission when the group made the decision part of a demand to reopen the environmental reviews of the Atlantic Coast and Mountain Valley gas pipeline projects.

"In light of the recent decision by the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals in Sierra Club v.

FERC ... FERC must revisit its impacts analysis in the environmental impact statement (EIS) for the Atlantic Coast pipeline" and Mountain Valley, Sierra Club staff attorney Elly Benson wrote in a Sept. 18 letter to the regulator.

FERC staff had issued a positive final environmental impact statement for each of the two pipeline projects months earlier.

The Sierra Club, representing many environmental groups in two Sept. 18 requests to the commission, said FERC should reopen the records for the projects "for the purpose of taking additional evidence regarding greenhouse gas emissions and climate impacts" and issue supplemental environmental impact statements. As it does that, the group said, FERC should also address "deficiencies" with the environmental review that were already highlighted by the opposition.

In an Aug. 22 court decision, a majority at the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit granted a petition by the Sierra Club and other groups and vacated FERC approval orders for the Enbridge Inc.-led Sabal Trail pipeline and other components of the Southeast Market Pipelines project. The court sent the matter back to FERC for additional analysis of downstream emissions from power plants connected to the pipeline. Observers have predicted that the decision could spell trouble for FERC pipeline reviews and even stall projects. (U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit, No. 16-1329)

The D.C. Circuit decision was a shot in the arm for those who until now have had little luck stopping the federal approval of pipeline projects. On Aug. 30, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation used the decision to deny water permits for a Millennium Pipeline Co. LLC lateral project, even though the project was already approved by FERC. The state agency said a "material change in applicable law" had rendered the FERC environmental review "inadequate and deficient."

In the latest round, FERC declared Sept. 15 that the state had waived its authority to issue the permits, because it took longer than a year to make the decision.

"The court's ruling was crystal clear," Kelly Martin, director of the Sierra Club's Beyond Dirty Fuels campaign, said in a statement accompanying the group's request to FERC. "FERC's past reviews of fracked gas pipelines have been woefully inadequate."

Aaron Ruby, a spokesman for Atlantic Coast project developer Dominion Energy Inc., called the Sierra Club filing "a desperate, last-minute delay tactic."

"I doubt it will be successful," Ruby said. "The FERC already evaluated downstream greenhouse gas emissions in the ACP [Atlantic Coast pipeline]'s final EIS, so there's no need for further analysis. The EIS concluded that not only would the ACP not significantly contribute to climate change, but it could actually offset regional greenhouse gas emissions since much of the gas will be used to replace higher-emitting coal plants."

The Atlantic Coast pipeline project would put in place over 560 miles of greenfield pipeline. It would provide up to 1.5 Bcf/d of natural gas transportation capacity from a Dominion supply header in West Virginia to delivery points in Virginia and North Carolina, including interconnects with Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Co. LLC and Columbia Gas Transmission LLC. Atlantic Coast Pipeline LLC is a partnership of Dominion, Duke Energy Corp. and Southern Co.

The Mountain Valley project would install about 300 miles of pipeline. It would provide up to 2 Bcf/d of gas transportation capacity from West Virginia to the

Columbia and Transco systems. Mountain Valley is a joint venture of EQT Midstream Partners LP and affiliates of NextEra Energy Inc., RGC Resources Inc., WGL Holdings Inc. and Consolidated Edison Inc.

In addition to the Sierra Club challenge, eminent domain lawsuits by landowners and opposition groups have targeted FERC and the two projects. (FERC dockets CP15-554, CP15-555, CP16-10, CP16-13)

Pipeline foes cite recent ruling

After a recent federal appeals court victory, the Sierra Club on Monday asked the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to do an extra environmental review of two major proposed pipeline projects in the eastern US.

"The court's ruling was crystal clear," Kelly Martin, director of the Sierra Club's Beyond Dirty Fuels campaign said in a statement. "FERC's past reviews of fracked gas pipelines have been woefully inadequate.

"It's time for FERC to be honest about what we have known for decades — these fracked gas pipelines are a threat to our lives, our communities and our planet," Martin added.

Sierra Club argued that FERC must do a supplemental environmental impact statement for Dominion Energy's 600-mile Atlantic Coast Pipeline and Supply Header Project, as well as EQT Midstream Partners' 300-mile Mountain Valley Pipeline.

The group claimed that FERC must revisit its environmental analysis for the projects in light of the DC Circuit Court of Appeals' August 22 decision in Sierra Club v. FERC (16-1329).

In that case, the court found that FERC's environmental review of the Sabal Trail pipeline and other segments of the Southeast Markets Pipeline lacked enough information on downstream greenhouse gas emissions .

Sierra Club has already used the case to oppose several other pipelines, including Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line's Atlantic Sunrise project and Millennium Pipeline's Eastern System Upgrade.

In its Monday letter about the ACP proceeding, Sierra Club said, "Several holdings from the decision apply to FERC's environmental review of the ACP, and indicate that FERC has impermissibly downplayed and avoided legally sufficient disclosure of the project's impacts here."

For example, the group said FERC downplayed ACP's downstream greenhouse gas emissions by noting that it would displace some coal use and potentially offset some regional GHG emissions . But the DC Circuit rejected this approach, Sierra Club argued.

"As with the Sabal Trail EIS, the ACP EIS makes no attempt to assess whether total emissions would be reduced or increased, or what the degree of reduction or

increase would be," the letter said. "Thus, the ACP EIS similarly fails to fulfill its primary purpose."

FERC issued a final EIS for the ACP and Supply Header projects in July (CP15-554, CP15-555). The 1.5 Bcf/d ACP project would span

from West Virginiathrough Virginia and then into North Carolina . According to Dominion, 68% of the supplies would serve electric generation in North Carolina and Virginiaand 24% would serve local gas utilities.

Dominion pushed back against Sierra Club's claims. "This is nothing more than a desperate, last-minute delay tactic, and I doubt it will be successful," said Dominion spokesman Aaron Ruby.

"The FERC already evaluated downstream greenhouse gas emissions in the ACP's final EIS, so there's no need for further analysis," Ruby said. "The EIS concluded that not only would the ACP not significantly contribute to climate change, but it could actually offset regional greenhouse gas emissions since much of the gas will be used to replace higher-emitting coal plants," he added.

Meanwhile, Sierra Club raised similar concerns about the Mountain Valley Pipeline (CP16-10). In the MVP EIS, FERC spent most of its discussion of downstream GHGs explaining why it could not perform a more thorough analysis, the group said.

But the DC Circuit found in Sierra Club v. FERC that the EIS needs include a discussion of the significance of this indirect effect as well as the incremental impact of the action when added to other past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions, the group argued.

EQT spokeswoman Natalie Cox said that the MVP project team worked diligently to provide accurate and comprehensive information to FERC, noting that FERC's final EIS includes a comprehensive discussion of GHG emissions.

"We respect the opinion of those who disagree; however, we also understand that despite our efforts to design a route with the least overall impact to the environment, and despite pipelines' record as the safest way to transport natural gas , some will continue to oppose underground, natural gas infrastructure," Cox said.

The MVP project would span from northwestern West Virginia to southern Virginia , and provide 2 Bcf/d of capacity to markets in the Mid- and South Atlantic regions of the US .

FERC issued a final EIS for the MVP project in June. The review also included the related Equitrans Expansion Project (CP16-13), which would use compression to transport 0.4 Bcf/d north-south on Equitrans' existing system through interconnections to other systems, including the MVP.

FERC overrules New York permit denial for Millennium gas pipeline

Dive Brief:

Federal energy regulators on Friday overruled a New York decision last month to deny a water quality certification to the 8-mile Valley Lateral pipeline proposed by

Millennium Pipeline.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission on Friday <u>issued an order</u> ruling the New York Department of Environmental Conservation waited too long to make a decision and had "waived" its authority on the matter.

The short lateral would connect from Millennium Pipeline to a <u>680 MW natural gas</u> plant being developed by Competitive Energy Ventures. Two other pipeline companies will reportedly seek similar waivers from FERC.

Dive Insight:

The implications of FERC's ruling could stretch beyond the Millennium proceeding and may signal a commission getting more involved in infrastructure development, even if it means overruling state regulators.

New York received Millennium's application in late 2015 but only denied it last month. According to FERC, by not acting within a year the commission ceded its authority.

"We find that the New York DEC, by failing to act within the one-year timeframe required by the [Clean Water Act], waived its authority to issue or deny a water quality certification," the commission wrote.

Williams and National Fuel, two other pipeline companies, have indicated they <u>would</u> <u>seek similar waivers</u> for their Constitution and Northern Access pipelines, Reuters reports.

Natural gas companies say that in recent years citizen opposition to pipelines and plants has made it nearly impossible to site new infrastructure in New England, <u>potentially threatening fuel supplies</u> to generators during extreme weather events.

Those companies praised the decision, while environmentalists worried it could signal that new FERC appointees could overrule other state decisions on pipeline infrastructure. Green groups question the need for new pipelines and argue federal regulators do not properly account for ecological risks tied to pipeline development.

"States unquestionably have the authority to rule whether a dirty, dangerous fracked gas pipeline violates clean water laws, and nowhere is FERC granted the right to override that authority," Sierra Club Atlantic Chapter Director Roger Downs said in a statement. "Donald Trump and his nominees have once again proven to be nothing more than industry shills protecting corporate polluter profits over the rights of Americans to access clean water."

New York's decision to deny the water quality certificate followed an August <u>ruling</u> from D.C. Circuit Court, which found that federal regulators <u>should</u> have considered the impacts of climate change when considering a project last year.

Environmentalists have long pushed FERC to factor in climate risks, but the newlyconstituted commission does not appear likely to let those considerations prevent pipeline development.

Acting Chairman Neil Chatterjee and Commissioner Robert Powerlson, both <u>confirmed</u> in August, pledged to support infrastructure development in their Senate confirmation hearings. And nominee Kevin McIntyre, expected to become chairman if confirmed, <u>wrote in testimony</u> last week that FERC "does not have a climate change mission" and that the commission's decisions already take into account potential risks. "It is my understanding that current commission requirements already require consideration of the greenhouse gas emissions associated with the construction and operation of proposed natural gas facilities, as well as impacts potentially resulting from climate change," McIntyre wrote.

FERC, New York at odds over pipeline permits

ALBANY — A decision by federal regulators to overturn the Cuomo administration's denial of a water permit to a natural gas transmission project could help break the logjam that has ensnared controversial pipeline projects proposed for western New York and the Oneonta region, an energy industry leader said Monday.

Gavin Donahue, president of the Independent Power Producers of New York State, said the Sept. 15 decision by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in a case involving what would be an 8-mile stretch of the Millennium Pipeline is "a very positive sign" that the Northern Access Project and Constitution Pipeline projects will gain similar approvals from the federal agency.

"What I'm encouraged by is the pace of the response, with FERC seeing what New York state was trying to do and saying, 'Wait a minute. This doesn't pass the smell test," Donahue said in an interview.

Donahue said the directive from FERC has rekindled industry hopes that similar waivers will be granted to National Fuel Gas Co.'s Northern Access Project, which would slice across parts of Niagara County, as well as the Constitution project that would impact Delaware, Schoharie, Chenango and Broome counties.

Northern Access and Constitution have been blocked by the state Department of Environmental Conservation, an agency under the control of Gov. Andrew Cuomo.

In a statement regarding FERC's decision, DEC officials said they are considering "all legal options to protect public health and the environment."

FERC's action was seen by environmental activists as a departure from its practice of allowing state regulators to evaluate water-quality impacts from pipeline projects.

The federal agency said in its order that state regulators may deny an application if it does not meet Clean Water Act requirements. But in the Millennium project, "New York DEC declined to take that step or to otherwise timely act on Millennium's application."

Anne Marie Garti, an environmental lawyer from Delaware County who has been a leader in an activist group called Stop the Pipeline, said the legal issues surrounding the state's denial of the water permit for Constitution are very different than those enveloping the Millennium project.

Garti, who is also involved in ongoing litigation regarding FERC's approval of the Constitution project, predicted the would-be developers of that pipeline "will lose" because DEC complied with the legal standards outlined by FERC in its decision on Millennium.

But a spokesman for the Constitution project, Christopher Stockton, said the developers are pursuing "all options" to knock out the DEC denial of the permit needed by the transmission system.

He said the company will "seek a similar Clean Water Act Section 401 waiver determination directly from FERC," in line with a federal court ruling cited by FERC in its decision regarding Millennium.

Karen Merkel, a spokeswoman for National Gas, called the FERC ruling "a positive step for the natural gas undustry."

But she added that "our argument with regards to the Northern Access Project is substantially different. We continue to wait for a decision."

Under Cuomo's direction, New York has become the only state with shale gas deposits to ban the drilling technique known as horizontal hydraulic fracturing, which is used to tap the subterraneous supplies trapped beneath layers of rock.

FERC's decision to upend the denial from the Cuomo administration was ripped by Maya Van Rossum, director of the Delaware Riverkeeper Network. In an interview, she called the action "wholesale robbery of states' rights."

"They have been working very hard to undermine states' authority over these pipeline projects," she said of federal regulators. "It's a huge demonstration that Congress needs to hold hearings to investigate what is happening with this out-of-control agency."

National Fuel has signaled that its \$500 million Northern Access project would include a 22,214 kilowatt compressor station in the town of Pendleton as well as a new natural gas dehydration station in Wheatfield.

The developers of the proposed \$700 million Constitution Pipeline, led by Williams Partners, have suggested a major expansion of an existing compressor station in the Schoharie County town of Wright.

Roadblocks for LNG exports monitored

While touting increased estimates of recoverable US natural gas reserves that could support greater US LNG exports, an industry advocate Monday described several potential regulatory and legal roadblocks confronting the sector.

Speaking at an Energy Bar Association event on LNG exports fueled by hydraulic fracturing, Ben Norris, senior counsel of the American Petroleum Institute, said API is monitoring state and local bans, moratoria and regulations, as well as risks tied to litigation over the National Environmental Policy Act, tough-to-predict trade policies from the Trump administration and lower oil prices.

Colorado, Pennsylvania and Ohio are among states that continue to be on his radar,

he said. In Colorado, several front-range communities have been eying local regulations. Meanwhile, in Ohio, there also have been attempts at local bans targeting the midstream sector, such as by towns opposing the Nexus GasTransmission project, he noted.

Another speaker on the panel, Branko Terzic, managing director, Berkeley Research Group, suggested that the US, with its well-developed pipeline network, lacks the same level of risk to the ability to transport gas to export projects faced in other countries.

Norris said, however, "I think there is increasingly a transit locality risk."

While most such local attempts to ban midstream siting are pre-empted by US Federal Energy Regulatory Commission authorities, Norris said they still present "judicial risk." If such bans are put on the ballot and ratified, they may be subject to post-election challenges that involve a host of different laws and doctrines that differ from traditional pre-emption doctrines, he said.

Also making Norris' watch list were state rules focused on induced seismicity, for instance in Oklahoma, Ohio and Kansas, and severance taxes such as those debated in Colorado, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Attempts at fracking bans, he noted, have spread from "fringe" states to some producing states such as California and "frontier" states such as Florida .

NEPA risks seen at federal level

One of the biggest threats at the federal level, according to Norris, is an expansion of litigation risk related to NEPA. He called a recent DC Circuit Court of Appeals victory for the Sierra Club against FERC in relation to the Sabal Trail Pipeline "a little bit alarming" in terms of how it could affect the midstream sector.

In that case, the court vacated the certificate orders and found that FERC should have provided more information about downstream emissions from power plants or better explained its rationale for declining to quantify such emissions .

Issues raised in the litigation could be considered in legislative reform of NEPA and or through executive actions, he suggested.

Separately, trade policy has the potential to be a "joker in the deck," Norris suggested, "as this administration continues to take a different approach to free trade than previous administrations." While LNG exports to Mexico and Korea have begun with some reliance on the North American Free Trade Agreement and the US -Korea Free Trade Agreement, he questioned what the impacts on future LNG infrastructure would be if the US pulls out of those agreements.

"All of this is very much in flux" and has the ability to affect upstream, midstream and LNG export infrastructure, he said. Among other things, the industry is concerned about potential weakening of investor protections and investor-state dispute provisions in the agreements, he said.

He also raised concern about the presidential directive for a Commerce Department investigation into whether steel imports are harming national security.

On the positive side, Norris pointed to increased estimates of ultimate recovery of natural gas in the US, driven by innovation amid the low price environment, allowing more gas than was estimated in 2012 or 2013 to be produced by existing wells.

Williams to finish Atlantic Sunrise in 10 months

Williams said Monday it is on target to bring its Atlantic Sunrise pipeline expansion fully online within 10 months, now that it has officially begun construction of the greenfield portion of the 1.7-Bcf/d Northeast gas takeaway project.

The timeline released in a company statement means the \$3 billion Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line project is expected to be in full service in mid-July 2018, in line with previous forecasts. Site preparation for two compressor facilities got underway Friday, and the operator plans to begin pipeline work in Pennsylvaniaas early as September 25.

Environmental groups and some landowners have so far failed to persuade courts and regulators to block the pipeline, which is part of a wave of new gasinfrastructure that is designed to increase the flow of gas to demand centers in the Midwest and Southeast.

"There isn't any pending litigation which affects our right to start pipeline construction as scheduled. I can't speculate on potential outcomes for other pending suits," Williams spokesman Christopher Stockton said.

Atlantic Sunrise is expected to bolster production in the northeastern part of Pennsylvania, where output has generally flat-lined in recent years as a result of limited takeaway options. Between 2011 and 2014, production in the region more than quadrupled, rising from an average 1.6 Bcf/d to 8 Bcf/d. By 2017, gasproduction volumes have averaged 8.5 Bcf/d this year to date, underscoring the sharp slowdown in growth rates, data compiled by Platts Analytics' Bentek Energy show.

The Transco expansion is majority backed by regional producers, including Cabot Oil & Gas, which has subscribed to 850 MMcf/d, or 50% of the total project capacity. In addition, several downstream end-users have also subscribed to project capacity, including Duke Energy Carolinas and Southern Company, to bring incremental Marcellus shale supplies to their service areas in the US Southeast.

Transco was authorized to begin partial mainline service this month, and 400 MMcf/d of contracts from Zone 6 in southeastern Pennsylvania to Station 85 in Zone 4 were executed for a 10-month period starting September 1 this year, at a reservation rate of 20 cents/Dt per day and a commodity charge of 1.9 cents/Dt. Southbound flows measured at the Milepost 1575 South meter have increased to an average 1.57 Bcf/d this month to date, up 285 MMcf/d from the August daily average, Platts Analytics data show.

While the partial-service capacity supports higher outflows from the Northeast, existing system constraints limit the amount of production growth the partial service path will offer. Completing the greenfield pipeline work should alleviate that issue.

Williams said the 186 miles of pipeline installation will be broken into eight different spreads, six of which will be working concurrently in eight Pennsylvaniacounties. Beyond legal and regulatory issues, weather also will play a factor in Atlantic Sunrise beginning full service on its current schedule. Hurricane Harvey's impact last month

exposed the limitations of onshore and offshore oil and gas operators during big storms that roll through the Gulf of Mexico .

At full service, the expansion will transport up to 1.7 Bcf/d of incremental volumes from gathering and production meters in northeastern Pennsylvania to as far south as Transco's Station 85 pooling point in Alabama . It is also expected to be a major primary supply source for Dominion Energy's Cove Point LNGexport terminal in Maryland , which receives gas from an interconnect between Transco and Dominion Energy Cove Point Pipeline in northern Virginia .

The greenfield Pennsylvania facilities that were authorized for construction comprise the major market-impacting components of the project. In addition to the construction of the new pipeline and compressor stations in Pennsylvania , Transco is also implementing mainline system upgrades to support higher bi-directional, Northeastto-Southeast flow capacity.

Atlantic Sunrise has faced much opposition to get to this point, due in part to Pennsylvania 's central role in the growth of the region's gas production alongside its proximity to large population centers.

Among other things, it has battled 40 environmental and community groups that wrote a letter to Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf and DEP Secretary Patrick McDonnell objecting to the project and urging that certain permits be rejected. A group of nuns that owns a property that the pipeline will pass through also objected to granting Williams an easement.

So far, Williams has overcome those obstacles, and in its statement Monday it sought to turn the page on the controversy by pointing to the jobs, economic growth and energy security the project will support.

"As we begin construction of the greenfield facilities, we are committed to installing this infrastructure in a safe, environmentally responsible manner and in full compliance with rigorous state and federal environmental permits and standards," said Micheal Dunn, Williams chief operating officer.

National Fuel plans to modernize parts of Pa. gas system

National Fuel Gas Supply Corp. plans to ask the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for permission to replace old natural gas pipeline and compression facilities in Pennsylvania with new infrastructure.

National Fuel filed a Sept. 14 request to place its FM100 modernization project in the commission's prefiling review process. National Fuel is a subsidiary of National Fuel Gas Co.

Through the project, National Fuel would abandon in place 57 miles of 12-inchdiameter to 24-inch-diameter pipeline, comprising 53 miles of 1950s vintage bare steel pipe and 4 miles of newer coated steel pipe in Cameron, Clearfield, Elk, McKean and Potter counties in Pennsylvania. The project would also include abandoning and removing the Costello compressor station in Potter County.

The old infrastructure would be replaced with 30 miles of new coated steel pipeline

and 12.5 miles of FlexSteel Pipeline Technologies Inc. pipe, ranging from 12-inchdiameter to 16-inch-diameter lines. The new pipeline, which would provide bidirectional transportation services to customers, would run from McKean County to an interconnection with National Fuel Lines YM50 and YM224 in Potter County. A 1.2 mile, 24-inch-diameter pipeline loop would be built in Potter County to take on redirected transportation services on Line YM224.

National Fuel would also install new compression equipment near an interconnection with NFG Midstream Clermont LLC in McKean County and a measurement and regulation facility at the eastern end of the proposed pipeline in Potter County. (FERC docket PF17-10)

Kinder Morgan unit plans to drop Wyo. gas processing plant

Colorado Interstate Gas Co. LLC asked the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for authorization to abandon natural gas processing facilities in Wyoming.

Under the requested authorizations, Colorado Interstate Gas would abandon in place facilities related to the Rawlins processing plant, a combination lean oil and fractionation facility that processes wet natural gas volumes from the Wind River Basin in north central Wyoming. Related facilities, including liquids pipelines, measurement equipment and rail loading facilities, would be sold. The facilities, all in Carbon County, Wyo., are no longer needed for Colorado Interstate Gas' mainline transportation operations, according to the company.

The transportation and measurement facilities would be sold to Sinclair Wyoming Refining Company.

In a Sept. 14 filing with the commission, Colorado Interstate Gas said it had decided on abandonment due to a downward trend in wet gas production in the area and mechanical issues with the facilities. The company noted that long-term projections suggest production levels will keep going lower.

"The need for processing natural gas has also been progressively diminishing as volumes decreased below the plant's minimum volume of approximately 60,000 Mcf/d to efficiently process the gas," Colorado Interstate Gas said.

Colorado Interstate Gas, a subsidiary of Kinder Morgan Inc.'s El Paso Pipeline Partners LP, said the mechanical problems would require about \$24 million to fix. (FERC docket CP17-493)

Editorial: Dizzying contradictions: power, pipeline, permits

Pay attention. We're going to be addressing an issue with several moving parts and space is limited.

The issue is the almost-completed 650-megawatt CPV power plant towering over Route 6 in the Town of Wawayanda. Specifically, should it be allowed to proceed to completion? The feds say yes, the state says not yet and a lot of local residents say never.

Here's the situation today. In a dizzying two-week period, a plan to build a 7.8-milelong pipeline to deliver natural gas to the Competitive Power Ventures facility was: 1) Rejected by the state Department of Environmental Conservation on the grounds that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's environmental review of the \$57.3 million project was "inadequate and deficient" and 2) In effect, given the go-ahead when the FERC merely said the DEC had waived its right to deny the application because it had waited too long.

The flurry of activity was over an application for a Clean Waters Act permit by Millennium Pipeline Co. and permits to allow the pipeline to cross streams and disturb wetlands. The DEC says that it twice issued notices to Millennium saying its application was incomplete, claiming that gave the state agency more time to make its decision. FERC said no.

There's no doubt the state has been less than speedy in handling this matter, as FERC suggests, but speed isn't always a plus. Also, in rejecting the pipeline plan, the DEC did not mention its impact on water, but rather, it asked FERC to "reopen the evidentiary record" to hear testimony about greenhouse gas emissions associated with burning natural gas from the power plant, or for an environmental impact statement.

More work for FERC. The DEC's delays and rejections of the pipeline applications all point to deficient reviews by FERC. Far be it for us to suggest any inter-agency feuding between the state and the feds, but we are in a new anti-regulation era in Washington, D.C.

Millennium says it will go ahead and build the pipeline. CPV says it hopes to be operating early next year. The DEC is likely to go to court to challenge the FERC ruling.

But wait, there's one other complicating factor that is already in the courts - federal trials involving bribery charges against Joe Percoco, a former longtime top aide to Gov. Andrew Cuomo, and Peter Galbraith Kelly Jr., a former CPV executive. Those charges have raised doubts about the entire permitting process for the CPV plant, so much so that Orange County Executive Steve Neuhaus, a Republican, and as rabid a pro-development type as you can find, issued a statement saying, "Regardless of what one feels about CPV or Millennium, the arrests of people associated with the CPV project call each and every aspect of its approval into question."

His Democratic opponent this election year, Pat Davis, said when the DEC rejected the pipeline: "The interests of our residents should not be outweighed by those who seek to circumvent the rules, especially when it puts our environment and the health of our families at risk."

We agree, gentlemen. Without trust, the project should not be allowed to proceed.

Perry disputes grid models, denies renewable regs pre-emption

Energy Secretary Rick Perry told Senate lawmakers that his agency would not preempt state renewable portfolio standards and questioned models of high levels of wind and solar energy for the electric grid, according to documents obtained by E&E News and submitted to the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

In questions for the record obtained by a Freedom of Information Act request, Perry pushed for everything from cutting the Strategic Petroleum Reserve to shifting DOE programs to "early stage" research.

The pre-emption issue came up at an April event in New York City, where Perry suggested his department could intervene in state energy planning deemed a threat to baseload coal and nuclear plants (Energywire, April 26).

But when pressed by Sen. Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.) about the issue, Perry wrote in the 82-page <u>document</u>, "there is no national renewable portfolio standard authority that could serve as a basis under which the department could preempt state renewable portfolio standards."

Perry also highlighted shortcomings of models supporting the feasibility of high levels of renewables on the grid. Last year, the National Renewable Energy Laboratory concluded that wind and solar could supply 30 percent of the annual power for the nation's Eastern grid without reliability concerns (<u>Greenwire</u>, Aug. 31, 2016).

Perry praised that and similar studies as important building blocks but said they were not definitive.

"The studies, however, did not conclusively model the impact of high penetrations of variable renewable energy. For example, the study indicating the potential for 80 percent renewable generation showed modeling feasibility only if there were also grid changes equivalent to building over 40 new 1,000 megawatt transmission lines across the nation," he wrote.

The answers were submitted in July, before the release of DOE's grid study analyzing factors affecting baseload power. That study concluded that natural gas was a chief driver of recent coal plant retirements. While Perry has made similar comments before on many topics, his answers provide more detail about the department's thinking on budget planning and regulations.

For example, Perry was pressed on whether DOE would meet its commitments on efficiency standards, considered by environmentalists to be a chief federal tool in cutting energy use and emissions. Perry pledged that in fiscal 2018, DOE would fund all necessary steps to finalize legally required efficiency standards and test procedures and meet all statutory deadlines.

"DOE is committed to meeting its legislatively mandated deadlines for covered appliances and equipment," Perry wrote.

Similarly, he pledged that DOE would "follow the law" in funding Advanced Research Projects Agency-Energy projects, despite the president's budget proposal to eliminate the program.

E&E News released portions of the answers last week in which Perry expanded on

his views of the national labs and climate change (E&E Daily, Sept. 13). Perry said there currently is not a process in place for a "red team" exercise to review climate science and reiterated earlier comments that humans are driving climate change. Perry said there are other multiple factors driving warming temperatures, even though most scientists say humans are the main cause.

"As I have previously stated, the climate is changing and man is having an impact. There are several 'control knobs' which contribute to that change," he wrote. DOE did not respond to a request for comment.

The answers were submitted after reports emerged that Russian hackers could disable the electric grid. Perry was asked how cybersecurity could be a top priority if President Trump's budget proposes slashing cybersecurity programs.

Many of the proposed funding cuts resulted from completion of earlier activities, he said. DOE has put together a "multiyear plan" for cybersecurity that leverages "technical and financial resources from industry and government," he added.

On Friday, Perry said recent storms show the importance of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, which Trump proposed cutting in half (see related story).

In his earlier responses, Perry said he supported a shrunken SPR.

"While the SPR continues to remain a vital national energy security asset, given increased reliance on and availability of domestic sources of production, the administration believes the U.S. can meet its energy security requirements with a smaller SPR," Perry said.

FACTBOX: Florida load normalizes, outages fall

With electric service restored to more than 1 million customers over the weekend, power demand and prices continued to normalize in the area impacted by Hurricane Irma's path through Florida nine days ago.

Prices

Florida next-day on-peak power was assessed in the high \$30s/MWh Monday, up from Friday's assessment in the low \$30s/MWh and last week's average in the low \$30s/MWh, according to S&P Global Platts data.

The same assessment hit a recent low of \$24/MWh on September 11, a day after Irma made landfall in Florida . Before that it had averaged in the high \$20s/MWh in September.

Outages

On September 11 there were nearly 8 million customers without power, according to

the Edison Electric Institute. About 330,000 remained without power Monday afternoon, including:

Florida Power & Light: 204,100, down from 1,004,915 Friday afternoon

Duke Energy Florida : 115,447, down from 206,765

Florida Keys Electric Cooperative: 6,615, down from 12,124

Power demand

With limited remaining outages and commerce picking back up, power demand in Florida is nearing year-ago levels.

Florida electricity demand climbed above 41 GW as of 4 pm EDT, according to Energy Information Administration data. Demand Friday topped out at just above 40 GW. Florida demand on September 18, 2016, peaked at 42.4 GW.

Restoration efforts

More than 60,000 utility workers continue to work around the clock restoring power to the remaining affected customers, EEI said.

Florida Power & Light has assembled the largest restoration workforce in US history — more than 27,000.

Michigan PSC postpones LCR until 2018

A Michigan agency will put off until 2018 the requirement that electric providers source a portion of their power from in-state generation, as Michigan businesses, schools and legislators have voiced concern that the rule will force customers to buy from monopoly utilities.

Saying the state power grid's reliability is at stake, the Michigan Public Service Commission issued an order on Friday that includes guidelines for electricity providers to demonstrate adequate power supply. But the commission will wait until 2018 to begin implementing a local clearing requirement (LCR) that requires a portion of the state's power to be local.

Providers will have to comply with the in-state generation requirement while demonstrating to the PSC in late 2018 to early 2019 that they have enough supply for the 2022 planning year, according to press statement released by the commission.

The PSC opened a new contested case to "more fully examine the issue of implementing a locational requirement for electric generating resources," according to the release. The requirement was "too contentious" for commission staff and stakeholders to put forward a consensus proposal, PSC chair Sally Talberg told Platts by phone shortly after issuing the order.

The in-state generation requirement has raised so much opposition that Michigan Representative Gary Glenn threatened to take action during a September 12 House Energy Policy Committee meeting to hold the commission "accountable." Glenn, chair of the committee, feels the location requirement is a back-door attempt to force customers back to the state's largest utilities — DTE Energy and Consumers Energy — which own most of the state's generation, he told Platts in August.

In a September 15 statement, Glenn affirmed that he "will explore all possible avenues of recourse to ensure no locational requirement goes into effect at any time."

Local capacity is critical because the peninsular state is limited in terms of how much power it can import and has had a number of plant retirements, according to an issue brief the PSC issued with the order. The state's new energy law, which took effect April 20, authorizes the commission to work with MISO to determine the local clearing requirement, according to the issue brief.

"The new law is clear that all electric providers must contribute to and support the reliability of our electric system," the commission said in its release.

Energy Choice Now, a ratepayer advocacy group, denounced the PSC's order, saying it "cripples" the state's choice market, which is limited to 10% of the power demand in the state, according to a September 15 release. If alternative suppliers cannot comply with the demonstration requirements, they could get hit with stiff capacity charges, the agency said in its issue brief.

Mexico to solicit renewables-related transmission

Mexico's Energy Secretariat will call an auction for several power transmission projects in November, with an eye toward linking more renewable power sources to hungry markets. Results of the auction are expected to be announced in July.

"It is imperative to connect those areas of the republic that are farthest from the central region and have large renewable energy resources," Mexico's Energy Secretary Pedro Joaquin Coldwell said Monday at a webcast event from Mexico City.

SENER, the secretariat, will head open, competitive and transparent auctions to ask private companies to finance, develop and operate the transmission lines. SENER will choose which projects to auction from its National Electric System Development Program, known as PRODESEN.

Among PRODENSEN's projects are the \$1.1 billion, 1,800-km, 400 kV, HVDC line from Chiapas-Quintana Roo and the \$1 billion, 1,900-km, 400 kV HVDC line from Sinaloa to Baja California Sur.

Awarded companies will received compensation from Mexico's wholesale electricity market, Coldwell said. "With this, Mexico will be able to match the development of transmission lines with its growing [power] demand," he added.

To satisfy growing energy demand, Mexico expects that total installed capacity in the country will reach 113,269 GW by 2031 from 73,510 GW today.

The share of natural gas-fired, combined-cycle plants will grow to 39% in 2031 from 37% today. Clean capacity will rise to 50% from 29%.

Mexico could face bottlenecks for renewables

Cesar Hernandez Ochoa, Mexico's electricity deputy secretary, said at the event that the country will face multiple bottlenecks to connect renewable energy capacity if it doesn't develop transmission lines.

SENER's auction structure implements industry feedback received by Mexico's state utility CFE for the auctioning of its \$1.2 billion Oaxaca-Mexico Central Region HVDC transmission line.

A 174-page general contract for transmission projects was published by SENER at its website Monday.

At the event, Jose Alba, Iberdrola's country manager for Mexico, said the industry supported SENER's plan. Iberdrola, along with General Electric, Siemens, Hydro–Quebec, Berkshire Hathaway's TransCayon and Sempra Energy's IEnova, have expressed interest in building transmission lines in Mexico.

A new tariff system for transmission infrastructure will provide certainty to awarded companies, said Guillermo Garcia Alcocer, president commissioner of CRE, Mexico's Energy Regulatory Commission.

The regulation CRE approved for transmission lines auctioned by the government allows the income required to build the project to be directly transferred into the country's transmission rate. "This gives a guaranteed income and gives certainty to projects," Alcocer noted.

Mexico has 53 transmission regions, of which 12 have a congestion alert, which opens a door for reinforcement projects, he added.

By 2024, Mexico needs Peso 205.1 billion (\$11.5 billion) in new transmission projects, Eduardo Meraz Ateca, general director of CENACE, Mexico's National Electricity Control Centre, said at the event.

Mexico's Wind Energy Association has said that all generation projects in Mexico face severe interconnection challenges due to lack of transmission capacity. If the system is not expanded soon, the association sees that the country's wind capacity will grow to 12 GW by 2022 rather than 2020 from 6 GW in 2018.





A year and a half ago, Andrew Wheeler, a prominent coal lobbyist who worked for years for Senate Republicans, joined many other "establishment" Republicans in criticizing the long-shot candidacy of political newbie Donald Trump.

In February 2016, ahead of the Super Tuesday primaries, Wheeler laid out in a Facebook post a skepticism of Trump's character, business acumen and viability as a general-election candidate.

He wrote that Trump was a "bully," one who "hasn't been that successful" in business and who "has more baggage then all of the other Republican candidates combined." He wrote that Trump was a candidate who "has demonstrated through the debates and interviews that he doesn't understand how the government works."


But what truly precluded Trump from becoming president, Wheeler wrote in the since-deleted Facebook post obtained by The Energy 202, was his propensity to bully. "This alone should disqualify him from the White House."

Fast-forward to now: President Trump nominated Wheeler on Thursday to be deputy administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency.

In an interview on Friday, Wheeler explained to me how he went from critic of Trump to a volunteer for the eventual GOP nominee to, ultimately, Trump's choice for the No. 2 EPA position -- a nomination that has engendered some of the harshest condemnation of the administration from environmentalists to date.

"I was just looking at the debates and what I saw on the news, and I hadn't focused on what he was saying," Wheeler said this week of Trump, "and when I started looking into what he was saying and what his campaign and what his candidacy was about, I was fully on board."

Rewind to 2016: Back in February of that year, Wheeler was working as a volunteer consultant for energy and environmental policy for the campaign of Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.).

Ahead of the "Super Tuesday" vote in 11

states, Rubio was in a crowded race for the GOP presidential nod. The biggest hurdle between Rubio and a spot on the general-election ticket was Trump.

Friends of Wheeler — who has spent nearly a decade lobbying for energy companies such as coal giant Murray Energy — encouraged him to post on his personal Facebook page the day before the mega-primary a plea to those considering voting for Trump to reconsider.

"I'm from Ohio and have a lot of friends in Ohio who vote on Super Tuesday," Wheeler told The Post, "and a couple of friends had said to me when I was working for Rubio that I ought to post something about the campaign."


About three months later, Trump gave a major energy policy speech in North Dakota, where for the first time he laid out his "energy dominance" agenda emphasizing the development of domestic fossil-fuel resources.

In that May 2016 speech, Trump promised to "cancel" the Paris climate accord and

undo Obama administration efforts to give the EPA broader authority to regulate water pollution as part of the "Waters of the United States," or WOTUS, rule.

"I think the federal government should get out of the way," Trump told the crowd. "We have so much potential energy, people wouldn't even believe it."

"A lot of my friends in the Republican energy and environment field here in D.C. were impressed with that speech," Wheeler said this week.

Wheeler said he was finally swayed in June when Trump spoke at a closed-door

fundraising dinner in Wheeling, W.Va., hosted b Robert Murray, chief executive of Murray Energy, and attended by Wheeler. After leaving Capitol Hill, Wheeler worked as an energy consultant and lobbyist for Faegre Baker Daniels Consulting, where his clients have included Murray Energy. (Wheeler has also represented utility holding company Xcel Energy and the Nuclear Energy Institute, which lobbies for the U.S. nuclear industry.)

"It was about a 40-minute energy speech that [Trump] gave," Wheeler told The Post. "He didn't use notes. He didn't use a teleprompter. I really thought it was the most comprehensive energy speech by a presidential candidate I had ever heard." After that, Wheeler said he joined the Trump campaign as one of two volunteer energy and environmental policy consultants.

"I didn't talk to a lot of people about being on the campaigns," Wheeler said.

Rewind even more: Wheeler has been working in Washington since the early 1990's, starting as a career employee at the EPA in the George H.W. Bush administration and making a name for himself on Capitol Hill where he worked for more than a decade for the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.

If confirmed by the Senate, Wheeler will become the latest former staffer for Sen. James M. Inhofe (R-Okla.), the committee's former chairman, to join the EPA, now being run by another Oklahoma Republican, Scott Pruitt. Both Inhofe and Pruitt are known for questioning the scientific consensus that human activity is warming the planet.

Wheeler may join Ryan Jackson, Inhofe's former chief of staff who became Pruitt's chief of staff; and Amanda Gunasekara, who will advise the EPA administrator on air and climate issues.

Bigger picture: Wheeler isn't the first "establishment" Republican to join the Trump administration. You don't have to look beyond Trump's Cabinet for other examples, which include Energy Secretary Rick Perry (who once called Trump "a cancer on conservatism") and Housing and Urban Development Secretary Ben Carson (who once questioned Trump's religious faith).

Many Republicans will never see eye to eye with Trump on some issues, such as rewriting free-trade agreements or ramping up infrastructure spending.

But they can agree with the president on reining in the EPA.

Like other Republicans once apprehensive of Trump, Wheeler changed his tune after Trump articulated an energy and environmental platform (and, of course, once it became increasingly clear that Trump would win the GOP nomination).

Trump's emphasis on environmental deregulation is one of the several ways the unconventional Republican has endeared himself to the party's pre-2016 establishment.

Just take a look at one of Trump's harshest election critics, Jeb Bush. Last December, the former Florida governor heaped praise on Trump for choosing Pruitt as EPA administrator. "I cannot think of a person more suited to lead the Environmental Protection Agency," Bush wrote in a CNN op-ed.

Looking forward again: As Wheeler prepares to join the EPA, the agency is reviewing pollution rules that the Obama administration placed on coal-fired power plants that, in turn, affect coal suppliers such as Murray Energy.

They include rules regulating how much mercury coal plants can emit into the air and how a byproduct of those power plants called coal ash is disposed of.


Environmental groups harshly criticized Trump for nominating Wheeler. Citing his time in Inhofe's office, Melinda Pierce, legislative director at the Sierra Club, said, **"There actually could not have been a worse choice for this highly influential position."**

Scott Pruitt after the swearing-in ceremony for the U.S. ambassador to Canada in September. (REUTERS/Joshua Roberts)


-- Fight or flight: Here's the latest on the investigations into Cabinet members' flying habits...

 The EPA's inspector general is now probing Scott Pruitt's use of military and private flights, reports our colleague Brady Dennis. Pruitt took at least four chartered and military flights costing \$58,000 since February, per recent disclosures that led to the inspector general's investigation. The IG's office initially began examining Pruitt's frequent travel to his home state of Oklahoma.

- Rick Perry can't exactly get in trouble from the White House for a chartered flight he took in September, the day before Tom Price resigned as HHS secretary over his own use of private planes. That's because Perry's trip that came at the request of the White House, The Hill reports. Otherwise, Perry appears to be prefer flying Southwest or United.
- Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke is facing new criticism about his travel often accompanied by his wife, who is managing a Republican campaign in Montana — that included stops at political fundraisers and donor events. Mic has a full report here: "Two sources close to the Interior Department described an internal effort to hide the

presence of Lola Zinke on the official trips where she accompanied her husband."






-- The latest on Puerto Rico:

 There are still people dying in Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria. But the government has been slow to update its official death toll.
 According to BuzzFeed, funeral home directors say they have buried far people than accounted for in the official tally. And elected officials and people on the island have said they have buried people without notifying the government.

- Last week, The Energy 202 wrote about the importance of getting Puerto Rico's communications system up and running in order to restore electricity. Now, Google's parent company, Alphabet, says it's here to help. The FCC approved Alphabet's application to provide emergency cell service to Puerto Rico through solar-powered balloons, Reuters reports.
- Puerto Rico Gov. Ricardo Rosselló has said that he will ask lawmakers for a long-term relief package by January, Bloomberg reports.
- Meanwhile, as the recovery efforts continue, the political tensions are rising. FEMA administrator Brock Long said in an interview Sunday that criticism from San Juan mayor Carmen Yulín Cruz has been ignored. "We filtered out the mayor a long time ago, we don't have time for the political noise," Long said.

-- Friction between FERC and Perry:


Two little-noted comments from two of the three current members of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission last week are big deal for the fate of Perry's proposal to recover more revenue for coal-fired and nuclear power plants.

Background: Last month, Perry directed FERC to look into issuing new regulations to ensure that coal and nuclear plants were paid properly for adding to the reliability of the electric grid. In short order, representatives from other parts of the energy sector — including oil, gas, wind and solar — banded together in opposition to the the quick pace Perry wants those changes to be made.

What just happened: It looks like two FERC commissioners share some of those apprehensions. **Robert Powelson**, a FERC commissioner appointed by Trump, told an audience at the annual meeting of the Organization of PJM States, according to SNL Financial:

"We will not destroy the marketplace," Powelson said. "Markets have worked well and markets need to continue to work well." He added, "I did not sign up to go blow up the markets."

Following Powelson's remarks, **Cheryl LaFleur**, another FERC commissioner who was appointed by President Obama, issued her own "hear! hear!" on Twitter:



Why it matters: Even with the implicit support of the third FERC commissioner, Neil Chatterjee, who has already signaled he could be receptive to the move (saying recently, "I believe that generation, including our existing coal and nuclear fleet, need to be properly compensated to recognize the value they provide to the system"), Perry doesn't seem to have the FERC votes he needs to get the sweeping electricity-market regulations he wants.

-- **Trump couldn't save this one**: The latest in a string of coal plants to announce it is shuttering is the Monticello power plant in Texas, The Houston Chronicle reports. "The market's unprecedented low power price environment has profoundly impacted its operating revenue and no longer supports continued investment," Curt Morgan, CEO of Dallas-based Vistra, said in announcing the closure of the 1,800-megawatt facility.

What's important here: News of FERC's ongoing review of the U.S. electricity markets, which may send more revenue to coal and nuclear power plants — and in general, the Trump administration's pro-coal priorities — weren't enough to give operators at Luminant, a subsidiary of Vistra Energy, the confidence to keep the plant going. (Although it's worth noting that Texas's deregulated electricity market, contained within the state's borders, is not subject to the same interstate FERC jurisdiction most other U.S. electricity markets are.)

-- That was quick: Yet again following a major Atlantic storm — this time, Hurricane Nate — oil production in the Gulf of Mexico was halted. But a line buried in a Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement report, pointed out by Bloomberg News, indicates: "No damages have been reported." Already Chevron and Enbridge workers are returning to offshore platforms.




-- Ironman wants to rescue Puerto Rico: Tesla chief executive Elon Musk tweeted to Puerto Rican Gov. Rosselló with an idea: Let Tesla help to rebuild the island's electric grid with a high-tech solar grid. The two had a back-and-forth over the weekend about the idea.

Musk said that he had previously built solar grids for small island, tweeting that there "is no scalability limit, so it can be done for

Puerto Rico too."






The Post's Brian Fung writes: "While Musk's idea wouldn't solve Puerto Rico's current crisis — 90 percent of the island is still without power, and many people are having trouble getting clean water — it could set the island on the path to sustainable, renewable energy, which could reduce its dependence on imported fossil fuels and ultimately bolster its economy."

And for Puerto Rico, which has some of the highest energy prices in the world, a shift to solar power could help with the island's economic woes.

However, Musk may be too starry-eyed here. As The Post's Chris Mooney wrote last month: "at least until battery storage becomes more widely affordable, islanded grids could not solely be powered by the sun, which is only out during the day. They would instead need to alternate solar with some continuing use fossil fuels to ensure a continual electricity supply."


-- Another weekend, another hurricane:

After making landfall twice over the


weekend, Hurricane Nate was downgraded quickly into a tropical depression on Sunday as it moved inland, report The Post's Joel Achenbach and Patricia Sullivan. There have not been any reports of deaths or severe property damage, they add. A spokesman for the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency cited resources like sea walls, and updated building codes in place since Hurricane Katrina in 2005 as preventing extensive damage. Nate was the first hurricane since Katrina to come ashore in Mississippi, and the fourth this year to hit the United States.









Latest U.S. State to Offer Nukes a Lifeline Is Connecticut (1)

- Governor will review bill in context of overall budget
- Nuclear reeling under competition from cheap gas, renewables

(Bloomberg) --

Connecticut took a step toward propping up nuclear energy on Thursday, wading into a national debate over how to keep aging reactors running that's become so intense that even the Trump administration is weighing in.

A bill passed Thursday and sent to Connecticut Governor Dannel Malloydirects agencies to consider above-market power agreements for Dominion Energy Inc.'s Millstone plant, the state's sole nuclear plant. In seeking to shore up its profitability, Connecticut is following in the footsteps of New York and Illinois which have already offered subsidies to keep moneylosing operations there open.

Millstone is facing the same pressures from cheap natural gas and renewable energy that have led to a wave of reactor closures and prompted some states to offer subsidies. Just last month, U.S. Energy Secretary Rick Perry laid out a plan to reward nuclear and coal plants for their ability to supply around-the-clock power, a proposal that's drawn fierce opposition because of concerns it'll undermine the nature of competitive markets.

Dominion's chief executive officer, Tom Farrell, meanwhile described the Connecticut bill as "a path forward to retain 1,500 well-paying jobs and Millstone's substantial environmental, energy, and economic benefits for Connecticut."

The Connecticut House of Representatives voted in favor of the Millstone measure after the state's senate approved the bill last month. Dominion rose the most on an intraday basis since May.

"Our office will review this bill and it will be considered in the context of the overall budget," Chris Collibee, a spokesman for the governor, said by phone.

Dominion said in August it was limiting its hedging of 2018 production from the plant pending the outcome of legislation. If the plan is adopted, customers may pay a premium for nuclear power, set in a competitive auction alongside wind, solar and hydro.

"Millstone could sell about half of its output into this auction," Shahriar Pourreza, an analyst for Guggenheim Securities LLC, said by phone Wednesday. "It's a very good chunk." D US Equity

Skadden attorney John Shepherd Jr. is expected to be named FERC's next head of enforcement, according to two sources with knowledge of the plans.

Shepherd co-authored a <u>paper</u> for the Energy Law Journal in 2010 calling for new due process rules within the FERC enforcement office, which polices energy markets for manipulation, and has made headlines for levying multi-million dollar fines against firms like JPMorgan Chase and Barclays. Shepherd co-authored the paper with William Scherman, a former FERC general counsel who has been critical of the agency's enforcement work.

According to his <u>biography</u> on the Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom website, Shepherd's practice focuses on market design, market power and market manipulation issues in the energy and natural gas markets. His biography also highlights his success securing the "dismissal of a non-public investigation against a Midwest natural gas company for alleged capacity 'flipping' violations."

The sources said the timing of the appointment was not certain.

Reached by phone today, Shepherd said he had not been contacted about the position.

Last month, fellow Skadden attorney James Danly became FERC's general counsel.

D.C. CIRCUIT DENIES APPEAL OF FLEX LNG'S DOE LICENSE

Today, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit (D.C. Circuit) issued a <u>unanimous opinion</u> upholding the Department of Energy's (DOE) issuance of a license to Freeport LNG Export (FLEX) to export natural gas to non-free trade agreement destinations. Our impression of the oral argument held on February 2, 2017 led us to conclude that the environmental group's license appeal looked likely to fail. It did, however, the Trump Administration is now planning to modify its approach to infrastructure permitting generally in an announcement planned for later today.

The Sierra Club and other environmental groups had pressed the court to find the DOE's review under the *National Environmental Policy Act* (NEPA) and the *Natural Gas Act* (NGA) as insufficient. The DOE first adopted the facility-specific analysis taken by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), and then reviewed the FLEX project in the context of other proposed projects before it at the same time in two DOE-sponsored studies that it developed for context of the then-pending reviews. The first study was developed by the Energy Information Administration (EIA) and the second was developed on DOE's behalf by NERA Economic Consultants. DOE subsequently evaluated the project in the context of an Addendum report that specifically addressed the potential indirect impacts of natural gas exports not captured in the scope of the FERC's review, and a fourth study from the National Environmental Technology Labs to evaluate life-cycle greenhouse gas emissions.

Sierra Club criticized DOE's reliance on these generalized studies, and alleged that the Department was obligated to evaluate regional impacts at a more detailed level. However, the court found DOE's reasoning persuasive when it explained that notwithstanding the likelihood of natural gas originating from some predictable areas, the interconnected nature of the U.S. natural gas system also meant that export volumes could notionally come from anywhere. The DOE's took this higher-level view, and the court validated it. At the end of the day, the court found that the DOE's review was sufficient to meet its independent agency requirements associated with LNG licensing under NEPA. The court upheld DOE's position that even while some additional analyses sought by the green groups may be possible, they would not necessarily be meaningful to DOE's evaluation of the projects under NEPA. The D.C. Circuit has set oral arguments in three Sierra Club appeals of the non-FTA licenses for Cove Point, Sabine Pass Trains 5-6, and Corpus Christi for October 18. In Figure 78 of the August 14 edition of the *Regulated Energy Playbook*, published to clients yesterday, we detail the primary arguments advanced in each of the cases. We think that Sierra Club's chances of forcing reconsideration of the NEPA reviews of DOE's license approvals may fail as well, given the court's rationale in today's FLEX ruling.

The court found Sierra Club's public interest challenge in FLEX to be limited to environmental issues, which the court dismissed given the NEPA challenges failed. In three of the four pending cases (the fourth is a challenge to the expansion volumes at Sabine Pass Trains 1-4, but not yet scheduled for oral argument), Sierra Club alleges that DOE's assessment of the public interest is arbitrary and capricious for concluding exports would provide economic and other benefits that outweighed the potential adverse environmental impact.

The appeal against Cove Point, in our view, tracks strongly with the appeal contesting FLEX on the public interest issue, and we think DOE may prevail there. However, Sierra Club contends that DOE inadequately considered the full impacts on the public at large as opposed to the economic benefits primarily enjoyed by shareholders in natural gas production and export companies in the two Sabine Pass appeals and the Corpus Christi case. We will be watching to see whether argument in these cases suggests that the Sierra Club's subsequent appeals resolve the deficiencies enumerated by the court today, or whether, like FERC's reviews, the DOE's license approvals will stand.

In the context of President Trump's planned announcement this

afternoon of an Executive Order to "expedite" infrastructure project approvals, we would reiterate a theme we raised in the wake of the election. Under the Obama Administration, agencies expanded the scope of their environmental reviews, much to the frustration of project applicants frustrated with delays. However, many of those reviews have withstood judicial scrutiny – indeed, the D.C. Circuit rejected all four challenges to the FERC's NEPA review of LNG export facilities to date (none are currently pending) before upholding DOE today. In that context, a significant reversal of course on permit reviews by the Trump Administration – if quicker-paced reviews turn out to be materially less robust – could create incremental judicial review risk for future projects.


Fast-forward to now: President Trump nominated Wheeler on Thursday to be deputy administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency.


the GOP presidential nod. The biggest

hurdle between Rubio and a spot on the general-election ticket was Trump. Friends of Wheeler — who has spent nearly a decade lobbying for energy companies such as coal giant Murray Energy — encouraged him to post on his personal Facebook page the day before the mega-primary a plea to those considering voting for Trump to reconsider.

"I'm from Ohio and have a lot of friends in Ohio who vote on Super Tuesday," Wheeler told The Post, "and a couple of friends had said to me when I was working for Rubio that I ought to post something about the campaign."

About three months later, Trump gave a major energy policy speech in North Dakota, where for the first time he laid out his "energy dominance" agenda emphasizing the development of domestic fossil-fuel resources.

In that May 2016 speech, Trump promised to "cancel" the Paris climate accord and undo Obama administration efforts to give the EPA broader authority to regulate water pollution as part of the "Waters of the United States," or WOTUS, rule. "I think the federal government should get out of the way," Trump told the crowd. "We have so much potential energy, people wouldn't even believe it." "A lot of my friends in the Republican energy and environment field here in D.C. were impressed with that speech," Wheeler said this week.



hosted b Robert Murray, chief executive of

Murray Energy, and attended by Wheeler.

After leaving Capitol Hill, Wheeler worked

as an energy consultant and lobbyist

for Faegre Baker Daniels Consulting,

where his clients have included Murray

Energy. (Wheeler has also represented utility holding company Xcel Energy and the Nuclear Energy Institute, which lobbies for the U.S. nuclear industry.)

"It was about a 40-minute energy speech that [Trump] gave," Wheeler told The Post. "He didn't use notes. He didn't use a teleprompter. I really thought it was the most comprehensive energy speech by a presidential candidate I had ever heard." After that, Wheeler said he joined the Trump campaign as one of two volunteer energy and environmental policy consultants.

"I didn't talk to a lot of people about being on the campaigns," Wheeler said.

Rewind even more: Wheeler has been working in Washington since the early 1990's, starting as a career employee at the EPA in the George H.W. Bush administration and making a name for himself on Capitol Hill where he worked for more than a decade for the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.

If confirmed by the Senate, Wheeler will become the latest former staffer for Sen.

James M. Inhofe (R-Okla.), the committee's former chairman, to join the EPA, now being run by another Oklahoma Republican, Scott Pruitt. Both Inhofe and Pruitt are known for questioning the scientific consensus that human activity is warming the planet. Wheeler may join Ryan Jackson, Inhofe's former chief of staff who became Pruitt's chief of staff; and Amanda Gunasekara, who will advise the EPA administrator on air and climate issues. **Bigger picture**: Wheeler isn't the first "establishment" Republican to join the Trump administration. You don't have to look beyond Trump's Cabinet for other examples, which include Energy Secretary Rick Perry (who once called Trump "a cancer on conservatism") and Housing and Urban Development Secretary Ben Carson (who once questioned Trump's religious faith).

Many Republicans will never see eye to eye with Trump on some issues, such as rewriting free-trade agreements or ramping up infrastructure spending. But they can agree with the president on reining in the EPA. Like other Republicans once apprehensive of Trump, Wheeler changed his tune after Trump articulated an energy and environmental platform (and, of course, once it became increasingly clear that Trump would win the GOP nomination).

Trump's emphasis on environmental deregulation is one of the several ways the unconventional Republican has endeared himself to the party's pre-2016 establishment.

Just take a look at one of Trump's harshest election critics, Jeb Bush. Last December, the former Florida governor heaped praise on Trump for choosing Pruitt as EPA administrator. "I cannot think of a person more suited to lead the Environmental Protection Agency," Bush wrote in a CNN op-ed. **Looking forward again**: As Wheeler prepares to join the EPA, the agency is reviewing pollution rules that the Obama administration placed on coal-fired power plants that, in turn, affect coal suppliers such as Murray Energy.

They include rules regulating how much mercury coal plants can emit into the air and how a byproduct of those power plants called coal ash is disposed of.

Environmental groups harshly criticized Trump for nominating Wheeler. Citing his time in Inhofe's office, Melinda Pierce, legislative director at the Sierra Club, said, **"There actually could not have been a worse choice for this highly influential position."**




- There are still people dying in Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria. But the government has been slow to update its official death toll.



-- Friction between FERC and Perry:


Two little-noted comments from two of the three current members of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission last week are big deal for the fate of Perry's proposal to recover more revenue for coal-fired and nuclear power plants.

Background: Last month, Perry directed FERC to look into issuing new regulations to ensure that coal and nuclear plants were paid properly for adding to the reliability of the electric grid. In short order, representatives from other parts of the energy sector — including oil, gas, wind and solar — banded together in opposition to the the quick pace Perry wants those changes to be made.

What just happened: It looks like two FERC commissioners share some of those apprehensions. **Robert Powelson**, a FERC commissioner appointed by Trump, told an audience at the annual meeting of the Organization of PJM States, according to SNL Financial:

"We will not destroy the marketplace," Powelson said. "Markets have worked well and markets need to continue to work well." He added, "I did not sign up to go blow up the markets."

Following Powelson's remarks, **Cheryl LaFleur**, another FERC commissioner who was appointed by President Obama, issued her own "hear! hear!" on Twitter:



Why it matters: Even with the implicit support of the third FERC commissioner, Neil Chatterjee, who has already signaled he could be receptive to the move (saying recently, "I believe that generation, including our existing coal and nuclear fleet, need to be properly compensated to recognize the value they provide to the system"), Perry doesn't seem to have the FERC votes he needs to get the sweeping electricity-market regulations he wants.

-- Trump couldn't save this one: The latest in a string of coal plants to announce it is shuttering is the Monticello power plant in Texas, The Houston Chronicle reports. "The market's unprecedented low power price environment has profoundly impacted its operating revenue and no longer supports continued investment," Curt Morgan, CEO of Dallas-based Vistra, said in announcing the closure of the 1,800-megawatt facility. What's important here: News of FERC's ongoing review of the U.S. electricity markets, which may send more revenue to coal and nuclear power plants — and in general, the Trump administration's pro-coal priorities — weren't enough to give operators

at Luminant, a subsidiary of Vistra Energy, the confidence to keep the plant going. (Although it's worth noting that Texas's deregulated electricity market, contained within the state's borders, is not subject to the same interstate FERC jurisdiction most other U.S. electricity markets are.) -- That was quick: Yet again following a major Atlantic storm — this time, Hurricane Nate — oil production in the Gulf of Mexico was halted. But a line buried in a Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement report, pointed out by Bloomberg News, indicates: "No damages have been reported." Already Chevron and Enbridge workers are returning to offshore platforms.




-- Ironman wants to rescue Puerto Rico:





The Post's Brian Fung writes: "While Musk's idea wouldn't solve Puerto Rico's current crisis — 90 percent of the island is still without power, and many people are having trouble getting clean water — it could set the island on the path to sustainable, renewable

energy, which could reduce its dependence on imported fossil fuels and ultimately bolster its economy."

And for Puerto Rico, which has some of the highest energy prices in the world, a shift to solar power could help with the island's economic woes.

However, Musk may be too starry-eyed here. As The Post's Chris Mooney wrote last month: "at least until battery storage becomes more widely affordable, islanded grids could not solely be powered by the sun, which is only out during the day. They would instead need to alternate solar with some continuing use fossil fuels to ensure a continual electricity supply."







-- Another weekend, another hurricane:


After making landfall twice over the weekend, Hurricane Nate was downgraded quickly into a tropical depression on Sunday as it moved inland, report The Post's Joel Achenbach and Patricia Sullivan. There have not been any reports of deaths or severe property damage, they add. A spokesman for the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency cited resources like sea walls, and updated building codes in place since Hurricane Katrina in 2005 as preventing extensive damage. Nate was the first hurricane since Katrina to come ashore in Mississippi, and the fourth this year to hit the United States.

The New York Times summed up the feeling in Biloxi, Miss. well with this headline: "In a Season of Monsters, Gulf Coast Feels Lucky All It Got Was Nate."



Mr. Chairman, attached is the document filed by Valero requesting emergency relief and expedited consideration of a waiver of the Reid vapor pressure (RVP) specification for conventional and reformulated gasoline present in the Colonial pipeline tariff. Also appended to the filing is the broad waiver of the RVP regulatory requirement already issued by the US Environmental Protection Agency on Wednesday. It is our understanding that Colonial supports timely FERC intervention in this matter. Further, discussions with EPA and the Department of Homeland Security likewise support timely federal action to ensure motor fuels restored along the Colonial line as expeditiously as possible. State actors in Texas, including the Railroad Commission, the Texas Council on Environmental Quality, and the Office of the Governor have been actively involved in attempts to timely resolve this matter.

We hope the FERC can take action on this matter as soon as possible. The EPA RVP waiver was designed to remove bottlenecks in getting motor fuel to market that resulted from Hurricane Harvey. FERC intervention as soon as possible will help effectuate this decision of the federal family - helping restore production in the Gulf and protecting consumers around the country.

For the past five years, the Bipartisan Policy Center has had the pleasure and good fortune to work with former Senator Pete V. Domenici on its Debt Reduction Task Force, Health Care Cost Containment Initiative, Strategic Energy Policy Initiative, and Task Force on Defense Budget and Strategy. He is internationally acknowledged as one of the most knowledgeable and effective senators in the area of nuclear nonproliferation and threat reduction posed by foreign nuclear arms facilities. His diligent efforts resulted in increased funding for the nation's nuclear laboratories, and the introduction of programs to improve the testing of American nuclear weapons without use of physical, underground testing.

During his 36 years in the Senate, Domenici served as chairman and ranking minority member of the Senate Budget Committee and the Appropriations Subcommittee of Energy and Water Development. In addition, he served as chairman and ranking minority member of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee. As budget committee chairman, he produced two consecutive balanced budgets, the only federal balanced budgets in the last 50 years. In addition, he introduced the reconciliation process into Senate procedure, enabling spending reform to pass without the danger of filibuster. He authored and co-authored energy legislation in four consecutive decades beginning in the 1970s, which de-regulated natural gas, established the Synthetic Fuels Corporation, funded alternative energy sources like solar and wind energy, promoted

the renaissance of nuclear power plant generation of electricity, developed clean coal initiatives, and guided U.S. energy policy. Finally, after an 11-year effort, Domenici's Mental Health Parity bill, that guarantees that insurance company plans treat the mentally ill on an equal footing with other illnesses, became law in 2008.

It is a truly impressive set of accomplishments and testament to Senator Domenici's unwavering commitment to work with republicans and democrats alike to make government work for all Americans.

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

As you probably already know, last night the Senate confirmed Neil Chatterjee and Rob Powelson as new FERC commissioners. Once they are sworn in – hopefully in the next few days – our quorum will be restored, and we will start working through the backlog that has been building since February. I am excited to work with Neil and Rob, and hope you'll join me in welcoming them when they arrive.

I was also pleased to see that Kevin McIntyre (designated as future chairman) and Rich Glick were officially nominated earlier this week and will have their nomination hearing before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on September 7th. I have the utmost confidence in our collective ability to meet any challenges, and I will be honored to continue to serve as a Commissioner and to work with all of you as we move forward. Dear Colleague,

On Thursday December 15, 2016, the Partnership for Public Service published its annual <u>Best</u> <u>Places to Work in the Federal Government rankings and report</u>. I'm pleased to announce that the Commission ranked 4th among 27 midsize agencies in this year's rankings, moving up one spot from last year and rating as a top 5 agency for the third consecutive year.

The Partnership for Public Service created these rankings to provide a comprehensive measure of employee engagement across federal agencies. The data used to develop the rankings were based on results from the 2016 Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey (FEVS), which was administered by OPM last spring.

Five Commission offices were also rated in a separate <u>Agency Subcomponent Ranking</u> report. This ranking <u>only</u> included Commission offices that have 100 or more employees.

Some additional highlights:

• The Commission moved up one spot from last year, improving its score by 3.5 percentage points and ranking as #4 among midsize agencies

• The Commission ranked #1 in Work-Life Balance for the 3rd consecutive year among midsize agencies

• Agency subcomponent rankings (among 305 subcomponents across the government) for Commission offices with 100 or more employees:

- Office of Energy Market Oversight (OEMR) ranked #4
- Office of Enforcement (OE) ranked #6
- Office of General Counsel (OGC) ranked #9
- Office of the Executive Director (OED) ranked #21
- Office of Energy Projects (OEP) ranked #31

• Office of Energy Policy and Innovation (OEPI), along with a number of other Commission offices, was not included in the subcomponent rankings because it has less than 100 employees. However, based on OEPI's FEVS scores, the office would have ranked among the top 10% of subcomponents in government. OEPI had the highest score on the Employee Engagement Index among all offices at the Commission. Other smaller offices at the Commission also scored highly on FEVS.

As I noted earlier this year when I shared the results of the survey with you, the Commission remains committed to leveraging the information from the FEVS to sustain our areas of

strength and address areas where we can improve. Our continued efforts in this regard are required to ensure that FERC remains one of the best places to work in the government.

Thank you again for the hard work you do on behalf of the Nation's energy consumers and for making the Commission one of the top agencies in the government. You make this agency the special place that it is. Staff is truly FERC's greatest asset.
