

Aberdeen Neighborhood Housing Services, Inc. PROGRAM TITLE: Homeowner Rescue & Recovery Project

NeighborWorks of Grays Harbor County, through a competitive RFP process by the Office of the Attorney General, will receive funding to help mitigate the effects of foreclosure in eight far western counties. Those counties are Grays Harbor, Mason, Jefferson, Clallam, Pacific, Lewis, Wahkiakum, Cowlitz. The funds will be loaned to qualified homeowners who have suffered a hardship and are in mortgage default. The loan products will be either a "rescue loan" to bring a mortgage current and allow the homeowner to resume existing payments or a "refinance loan" resulting in an affordable payment. Catholic Charities Housing Services PROGRAM TITLE: Catholic Charities Housing Services

Our goal is to ensure that homeowners have the full-range of resources and access to the available programs and alternatives to help them stay in their homes. With our grant award of \$395,563, our intent is to hire an additional housing counselor focused solely on foreclosure prevention and mediation and part-time program assistant, by doing so we hope to dramatically increase the number of individuals that we are currently serving. In addition to increasing our in-house staff to assist homeowners, we will also use a significant portion of the grant award to establish and support a public outreach campaign to provide information to the public, especially low-income homeowners in properties facing foreclosure. The public outreach campaign will be designed to inform Spanish and English speakers, and other target audiences most in need of additional resources and assistance. Directing clients to safe local resource centers will help reduce the incidents of fraud and provide safe, trusted resources to local residents in a manner that promotes partnerships between and among service providers.

El Centro de la Raza

PROGRAM TITLE: Comprehensive Counseling and Education Services for Latinos Impacted by the Foreclosure Crisis

The Latino community was disproportionately harmed by unfair or deceptive mortgage servicing practices, and is an underserved consumer population affected by the foreclosure crisis. El Centro de la Raza's Homeownership Center will redress this disparity with the provision of comprehensive, culturally competent education and counseling services at no cost to Latino homeowners and victims of foreclosure. El Centro requests funds to support Latino borrowers who need loan modifications, principal reductions, and refinancing; assist Latino tenants or proprietors of rental property at risk of foreclosure; and strengthen the capacity of Latino families to manage and augment their household finances and credit to ameliorate the effects of the foreclosure crisis. El Centro will use the funds to hire, promote, and sustain the work of five fulltime staff for three years: Intake Coordinator, Foreclosure Intervention and Default Housing Counselor, Pre-Purchase Housing Counselor, Tenant and Proprietor Housing Counselor, and Financial Management and Credit Counselor.

HomeSight

PROGRAM TITLE: Downpayment Assistance for Purchase of Foreclosed Homes

HomeSight will use settlement funds to stabilize communities in King, Pierce, and Snohomish Counties that have been hit by the foreclosure crisis. We will provide at least 60 low- and moderate-income homebuyers with low-interest purchase assistance loans to buy foreclosed homes. These loans will make homeownership affordable and sustainable for these families and will reduce the number of vacant homes in their neighborhoods. In the past 22 years, as a one stop shop for responsible homeownership in the region and trusted non-profit advisor and counselor to over 10,000 individuals, HomeSight created over 1,500 new homeowners, built 500 new affordable homes and originated over \$20 million in downpayment assistance loans in the Puget Sound region.

Lifelong AIDS Alliance

PROGRAM TITLE: Lifelong Housing Safety Net Program

Lifelong Housing Safety Net Program will address the housing foreclosure crisis for individuals or families with chronic conditions or special needs. The program will build resilience and sustain permanent housing to prevent the costly decline of health circumstances. Lifelong AIDS Alliance, collaborating with Country Doctor Community Health Centers, will support 300 health-comprised individuals/families by providing enriched services and housing vouchers for up to 10 months inclusive of employment/income stability and access to primary care. Those eligible will demonstrate either foreclosure warning or notice and/or have experienced a foreclosure of a home in the previous 48 months, will be at or below 50% of the area median income, and will have chronic, special health needs. The project will focus in South King County serving 13 counties. The project serves to bridge these individuals to the full roll-out of the Affordable Care Act offering increased options for services due to chronic illness.

City of Tacoma/Tacoma Community Redevelopment Authority PROGRAM TITLE: Blight Prevention - Revitalization of Foreclosed, Vacant Houses

The City of Tacoma, through the Tacoma Community Redevelopment Authority (TCRA), will provide homeownership opportunities to buyers of foreclosed vacant houses in Tacoma's neighborhoods with the highest foreclosure rates; the Hilltop, Eastside and Southend/South Tacoma. The TCRA will provide down payment assistance to buyers purchasing a foreclosed house in one of these designated areas. The TCRA will also provide funding to our partner organizations; the Homeownership Center of Tacoma, Habitat for Humanity and the Tacoma Housing Authority to assist them acquire, refurbish and resell foreclosed houses in these neighborhoods. When a formerly foreclosed vacant house is occupied by a new owner, it typically becomes a model for the neighborhood. The lawn is mowed, the shrubbery is trimmed and the exterior surfaces of the house and fence are cleaned and painted. This pride in ownership spreads throughout the neighborhood and everyone starts to take a renewed interest in maintaining their own home. These funds are going to have a very positive impact on many neighborhoods in Tacoma. We are truly appreciative for this opportunity.

Approximately 3000 households will be served in this program.

Homeowner Stability Fund - This program will help stop preventable foreclosures for families seeking a loan modification through their lender. Qualified Households will receive a second mortgage loan of up to \$20,000 to bring their monthly mortgage, insurance, taxes, interest, homeowner dues and utility payments up to date to qualify for a loan modification. Approximately 550 households are expected to be served.

White Center Community Development Association (WCCDA) PROGRAM TITLE: White Center Housing Repair and Community Asset Building Program

The White Center Community Development Association and Habitat for Humanity Seattle/South King County have joined forces to implement a foreclosure prevention, anti-blight pilot project for the White Center neighborhood, located in unincorporated King County. The project will protect vulnerable low-income homeowners from the threat of foreclosure. We will do this by subsidizing critical, life safety home repairs, and connecting low-income homeowners with foreclosure prevention counseling and asset based opportunities, such as financial "fitness" and job training, to build household wealth. The project will train bi-lingual White Center residents to conduct culturally competent community outreach, deliver critical services to low-income homeowners who are facing the threat of foreclosure, and repair dilapidated single family housing to decrease neighborhood blight and increase public safety.
