Information revealing the identity of persons who are witnesses to or victims of crime or who file complaints with investigative, law enforcement, or penology agencies, other than the public disclosure commission, if the agency reasonably determines disclosure would endanger any person's life, physical safety, or property. When determining whether such risk is reasonable, the following nonexclusive factors may be considered: (A) the nature of the crime alleged, (B) any threats made by the suspect, (C) any past violent history of the suspect, and (D) the relationship between the suspect and the witness or victim. If at the time a complaint is filed If the complainant, victim, or witness indicates a desire for disclosure or nondisclosure, such desire shall govern unless the witness has already been publicly identified as the maker of the statement, PROVIDED that only that information that is public may be disclosed contrary to the witness's desire.
